**Death of W. J. Maxey.**

This honest, hard-working man, who was a good citizen and a brave and fear less soldier during the war, passed away Tuesday night at 2 o'clock. He had made a long and hard fight against the grim monster, but he suffered for several years with cancer and his last days were those of suffering and pain. His remains were interred in the Robinson graveyard on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

He was a native of this county, having been born near where he died nearly seventy-five years ago. When the war came on he became a member of Co. H 5th Miss. Reg., Lowry's brigade. He leaves a wife, who was Miss Robertson, and a son, Tom Maxey.

A negro named Locket, from Mr. C. S. Field's place in Southwest Noxubee was cut and seriously wounded last Friday while returning home from the hanging. The cutting was done by a man named Edmonson, who lives in Oklawaha. A warrant has been issued for his arrest. The difficulty occurred near the overhead bridge. What brought about the difficulty is not known, but it is said that Edmonson and two companions were in an intoxicated condition and fighting humor and the cutting was without provocation. It was thought at first that the negro would die, but we understand that he now has a fair chance to recover.

Winfield, son of Marshal Sargent was bitten on the foot Thursday night by a high-lip moccasin snake, while in front of the residence of Lester Williams. In a short time he was very sick and a badly frightened boy. The usual antidote was given but it refused to stay down. After an hour or two suffering he was given relief.

**Found Dead in Jail.**

Dave Dugan, eighty-eight years of age, was found dead on Thursday morning last in the old jail, where he had been placed on the Saturday before arriving maniac. Like all cases of that kind he developed wonderful strength, and it took five men to put him in his cell after he was brought to the jail. He continued to rave for several days but calmed down a day or two before his death. He seemed to be in his usual condition Wednesday night, but stated to the jailer, when he took him his supper, that he would die during the night. On Thursday morning, when the jailer carried him his breakfast, he was found sitting in an upright position on a window sill, with his feet on the floor. He had been raving for a week but he evidently died without a struggle.

The coroner held an inquest and the jury rendered a verdict that he came to his death from natural causes.
