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Our Former Governors.

A correspondent of the Jackson Pilot thus characterizes our former Governors:

- 1. Winthrop Barlett, native of Massachusetts, an old soldier of Covington's army, and a man of letters, but fond of his rum. 2. Wm. C. C. Claiborne, of Virginia, but appointed from Tennessee, temperate, but drank his wine. 3. Robert Williams, of North Carolina, drank freely and often under the influence of liquor. 4. David Holmes, of Virginia, temperate, but enjoyed his Madeira. 5. Walter Lewis of Virginia, good habits, but liked a glass of toddy. 6. George Folsom, of Virginia, at periods of his life very dissipated, fond of gambling and horse-racing; very quarrelsome when drinking. 7. Gerard C. Brandon, of Mississippi, of very social temperament, and often found the tempter too powerful; a noble and generous man. 8. Abram M. Scott, of South Carolina, of excellent habits, but enjoyed his brandy and water, and was a first-class judge of whiskey. 9. Hiram G. Rossels, of Georgia, fond of a frolic, easily excited, then apt to drink profusely, and became very irritable and pugnacious. 10. Charles Lynch, of South Carolina, temperate, but drank his sherry and bitters. 11. A. G. McNatt, of Virginia, could drink as much as 'any other man,' not particular what he drank would get very drunk, and then very argumentative and annoying, but never lost his memory or his mind. 12. T. M. Tucker, of North Carolina; in early life said to have been addicted to liquor, but when Governor he never displayed wines or spirits at his entertainments. 13. A. G. Brown, of South Carolina, of moderate and well regulated habits, but exceedingly hospitable and generous, always provided the best for his friends, and would tip glasses with them. 14. J. W. Matthews, of Tennessee, of excellent habits. 15. John A. Quitman, of New York, of well regulated habits, never fell into extremes, but relished a good bottle of wine, or even a well-flavored bowl of punch. 16. H. S. Foote, of Virginia, temperate, but sometimes took a social glass. 17. John J. McRae, of Mississippi, of ardent, mercurial temperament, a keen relish for anything delicate and piquant, extremely social, easily overcome by any excess, and was often surprised by the tempter. No man was ever more loved. And with this I close the list, as I was never at Jackson after Governor McRae retired from office, until long after the war. Those distinguished gentlemen—Petus, Clarke, and Humphreys—all elected by the people, were called in succession to the executive chair, and the late William L. Sharkey by a commission from President Johnson. In office each maintained its honor and dignity, standing in all respects above reproach, but were not totalitarians. MODERATOR.
