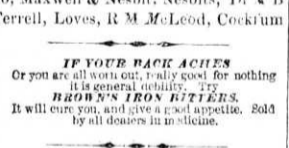

OF THE
Hernando Bank.

The Corporation is created to do a general banking and discount business. To buy, hold, sell, exchange or otherwise dispose of notes, bonds, mortgages and other evidences of indebtedness. To receive deposits of money and other things of value. To lend money on real, personal, chattel or other security and to acquire, hold, sell or exchange real estate and other property necessary for the better transaction or protection of its business.

The names of the persons incorporated are: Andrew P. Watson, Edward H. Granger, Don M. Dockery, Jordan A. Payne, Sam Powel and their associates and successors.

The corporation name is to be "The Hernando Bank," and as such to have power to contract and be contracted with, sue and be sued; to have perpetual succession and all powers proper and necessary to carry into effect the purposes for which the corporation is formed.

The domicile is to be Hernando, DeSoto County, in the State of Mississippi. The capital stock is to be Fifty Thousand Dollars, divided into shares of One Hundred Dollars each, and the stockholders shall be liable for the debts and contracts of said corporation to the amount of stock subscribed and held by each of them.

The first meeting may be held and the corporation organized at a time and place to be named by a majority of the incorporators, and may commence business at any time after one-half of the capital stock has been subscribed and paid in.
