

JARED SANDEKS IS INAUGURATED

Lieutenant Governor of Louisiana Steps Into the Governorship of His State.

RETIRING EXECUTIVE IS GIVEN AN OVATION

Ceremonies Attended by Grand Parade With the National Guard Participating in Full Uniform—Red Letter Day for Louisiana.

Baton Rouge, La., May 18.—With ceremonies more brilliant and elaborate than any ever before attempted on such an occasion in this state, Jared X. Sanders was today inaugurated governor of Louisiana, succeeding Newton C. Blanchard. A great crowd gathered from all sections of the state for the gala event, and nearly every man and woman of prominence in Louisiana witnessed the inaugural exercises.

The booming of cannon ushered in the red letter day. Before sunrise the crowds began to gather to do honor to the brilliant young Democrat who was about to begin his career as chief executive of the state, and hourly the number increased until the streets were crowded as never before.

The formal inauguration ceremony at the state house grounds, presided over by Governor Blanchard and Chief Justice Breaux, followed by local house and senate inaugural committees and officers of the two houses. The swearing in of Governor Sanders by Chief Justice Breaux and the inaugural address of the former was followed by a grand parade, in which the state militia, veterans' organizations and civic bodies participated. An inaugural ball and a pyrotechnical display will be held tonight.
