Famous Settlement Worker Will Address Students of Atlanta University.

Hearst News Service. Atlanta, Ga., May 25.—Miss Jane Adams, the famous settlement worker of Hull House, Chicago, will speak on "The Negro Family" at the thirteenth annual Atlanta conference at Atlanta University tomorrow.

Miss Adams will trace the family idea among negroes from Africa to America.

At the afternoon session of the conference there will be an exhibition of the work of the Atlanta Free Kindergarten Association a negro organization which has for two years past, by its own efforts, without help from the city, maintained four free kindergartens for the poorest class of colored children. A hundred or more of these children will take part in the exhibition.

New York, May 25.—Daniel F. Co-halan will be elected to succeed W. Burke Cockran as grand sache of the Tammany Society at the meeting this evening. Another matter likely to be considered is the advisability of moving the Tammany Hall headquarters uptown.
