NATCHEZ PEOPLE ARE COMING BUT WILL PROCEED SLOWLY

As stated in the Daily News last week, an excursion of the commercial men of Natchez will leave that city on Monday, June 8th, with Hattiesburg as the objective point.

Confirming this statement Secretary Larson, of the Hattiesburg Commercial Club, has received a letter from the secretary of the Commercial Club at Natchez, saying that the "Commercial people" of that city would leave on an excursion next Monday morning over the Natchez and Eastern and the Mississippi Central, but he could not say just when they would arrive in Hattiesburg, as they expect to stop for a while at a number of points along the line and that in this way one or two days may be consumed. He stated that he would write later giving the exact date they would arrive in Hattiesburg. It will be Tuesday or Wednesday before they get here as they want to cultivate the people along the line.
