Grizzled Survivors of the Lost Cause Preparing for Big Birmingham Meeting.

FORREST'S STAFF HOLDING REUNION

Those Who Want It Are Given Free Bed and Board by the Good People of Birmingham—Large Attendance Assured.

Hearst News Service. Birmingham, Ala., June 6.—The advance guard of Confederate Veterans is arriving today. Hundreds of the "old boys" reach the city on every train. The members of General Forrest's staff met this morning and other division reunions will be held during the day. The city is gorgeously decorated with Confederate flags and bunting and the stars and bars are displayed from hundreds of residences. All of the visiting veterans who desire it, are given bed and board free at Camp Gordon. The outlook is that the crowds this year will be larger than at any former reunion, despite the fact that the grizzled veterans of the "Lost Cause" are continually crossing the river to their eternal rest and reward.

Jackson, Ky., June 6.—The postponement secured in the trial of Beech Hargis, charged with the murder of his father, has reopened the enmities so long existing between the Hargis and Cockrill families and the officers of the county have been instructed by the court to use every possible means to prevent another bloody tragedy. It is understood that threats have been made to take young Hargis from the jail and lynch him and it is probable that he will be moved to some other county for safe-keeping.

EIGHT PERSONS KILLED IN TROLLEY COLLISION

Annapolis, Md., June 6.—In a head-on collision between two special cars on the Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis Electric Railroad shortly before 8 o'clock last night, eight persons were killed outright and a score of others were seriously injured, some of them perhaps fatally. The collision was due to a confusion of orders as the line has been running several extra cars each way in connection with the commencement festivities at the Naval Academy. The dead are: Richard Morton, 25 years old, Baltimore. A. H. Schultz, 40 years old, Baltimore. Police Patrolman Schriber, 40 years old, employed by the railway company, Academy Junction. An unidentified white woman, apparently about 25 years old, said to be from Baltimore and dressed in ball costume. Zach O'Neill, 25, New York, motor man of one of the wrecked cars. Ruth Slaughter, 6 years old, daughter of General Traffic Manager Wm. K. Slaughter, of the road. J. W. McDaniel, Baltimore. George White, Baltimore. The disaster occurred just beyond Camp Parole, which is the first station after leaving this city. Both the wrecked cars were specials, one of them bound from Baltimore to Annapolis, the other running from here, bound for Baltimore.

EXPLOSION KILLS SIX

Boiler Tube Exploded Wrecking Vessel and Injuring Large Number of Men.

GOVERNMENT WILL MAKE INVESTIGATION

Tennessee is the flagship of Rear Admiral Sebree, with Captain Thomas B. Howard commanding—Details of the disasters.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 6.—An official investigation has been ordered of the explosion of a boiler tube on board the armored cruiser Tennessee late yesterday afternoon, when six sailors were killed. The vessel was forced today to dock for repairs. The four dead sailors were buried this afternoon with simple honors. The cruiser Tennessee is the flagship of Rear Admiral Sebree, Captain Thomas B. Howard commanding, and is the flagship of the second division of the Pacific coast fleet. She is one of the new armored cruisers of 14,500 tons displacement, 22 knots, and carries a complement of about 900. Following is a list of the dead and injured just received by the local wireless station: Dead: George Wood, water tender. Earl Boggs, fireman, second class. Adolph Reinhold, machinist helper, second class. George Merk, fireman, first class. Probably fatally injured: F. S. Field, fireman, second class. E. N. Exantes, fireman, first class. E. J. Burns, coal passer. W. F. Burns, coal passer. J. J. Carroll, fireman, second class. T. P. Parsons, fireman, second class, slightly injured.

The armored cruiser Tennessee, commanded by Captain Thos. B. Howard, was launched Dec. 3, 1904, at the yards of the Cramp Shipbuilding Company in the presence of Governor Frazier, of Tennessee, and his staff and a large number of distinguished guests. The vessel was christened by the 16-year-old daughter of the Governor, Miss Annie Keith Frazier. The Tennessee, with the Washington, preceded Admiral Evans' battleship fleet to the Pacific, sailing from Hampton Roads October 12, of last year. On that voyage she was the flagship of Rear Admiral Muriel Sebree. The Tennessee is now attached to the second division of the first squadron of the Pacific fleet.

SIX SERIOUSLY HURT IN ACETYLENE EXPLOSION

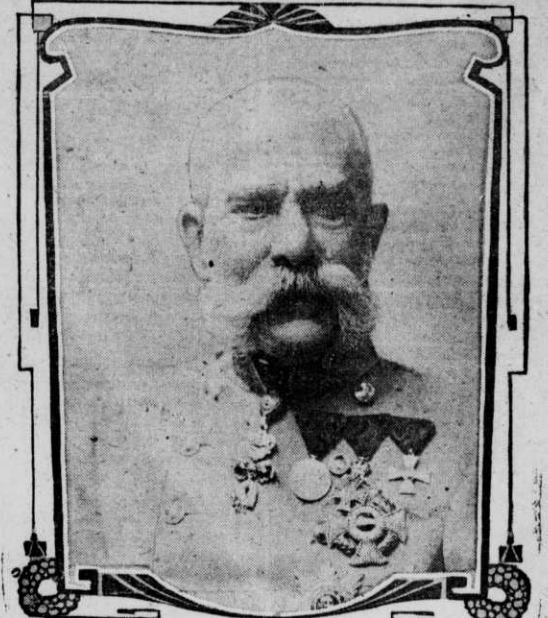
ANNA GOULD SOON TO WED

Hitchcock Says Taft Will Be Nominated By Acclamation at Chicago

Chicago, June 6.—Frank H. Hitchcock, manager of Taft's campaign committee, declared today that Taft would be nominated by acclamation and it was probable that no other name would be placed before the convention. Many of the prominent Republicans gathered here today believe that Taft and Hughes will be the ticket. Doliver, Guild, Hammons and Cortelyou are also mentioned for the vice presidency. The Florida contest case is before the executive committee today and it is believed that it will be thrown out. The regular delegation of the Florida convention is instructed for Taft.

BAD NEGRO AT LARGE

Desperate Black Killed Oklahoma Sheriff and Disappeared in the Woods.

TWO DEPUTIES ARE SERIOUSLY INJURED

Seven Deperadoes in the Gang Posses of Armed Citizens in Pursuit of the Dangerous Fugitives.

Oklahoma City, Okla., June 6.—Sheriff George Garrison was killed, two deputies seriously wounded, seven negroes while the officers were trying to capture a negro murderer. Immediately after the killing of Sheriff Garrison and the wounding of his deputies the black desperadoes took to the woods and a posse of several hundred armed men is now in pursuit.

HEFLIN CASE TO BE HEARD

Alabama Congressman Who Insulted Negro Insists on Early Trial.

Hearst News Service. Washington, June 6.—Congressman Thomas J. Hefflin, of Alabama, charged with shooting and dangerously wounding an insolent negro in Washington several weeks ago, will be arraigned Tuesday before Justice Bayard in the criminal court. The docket in the case shows two charges of assault with a dangerous weapon, one on the person of Louis Lundy, a negro, and the other on James McCreary, a race horse man. Hefflin asked for an early trial, but it is said here that an effort will be made to have the case postponed until after the presidential election. The white man, McCreary, was accidentally shot by Hefflin, who was defending McCreary's wife from insulting language used by the negro.

WATERWAYS COMMISSION
