Mrs. Harry Eckles and the little ones will go out to Mammoth Springs this week to spend a while.

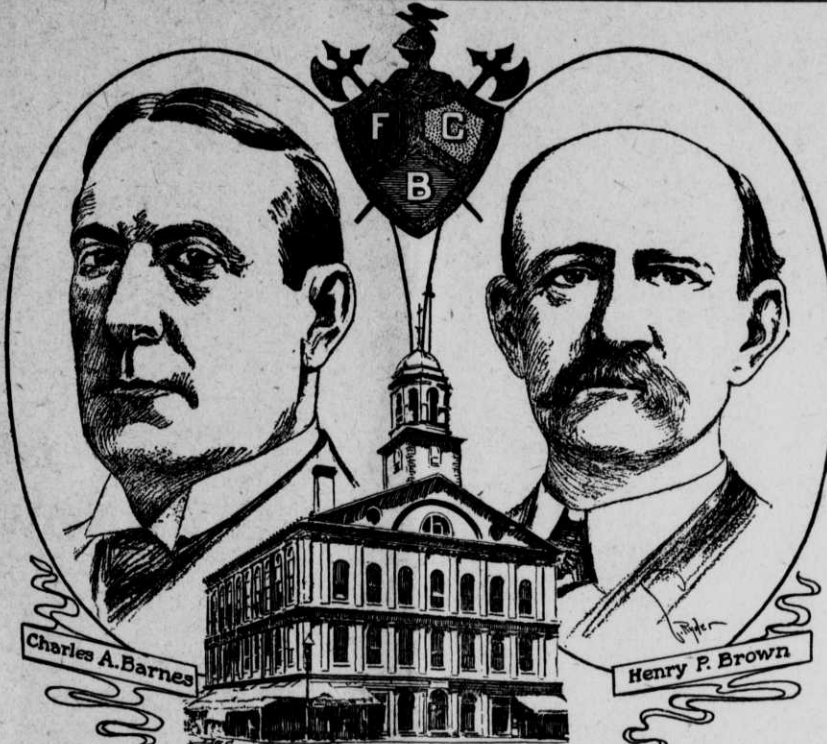
Mrs. B. I. Riley and daughter, Miss May, of Newhebron, are at Mammoth Springs spending a while.

THE CHARTER

Of Incorporation of Patrick Lumber and Tie Company.

- The corporate title of said company is Patrick Lumber and Tie Company.
- The names of the incorporators are: R. W. Patrick, postoffice Hattiesburg, Miss.; J. L. Brooks, postoffice Tifton, Ga.; F. M. Patrick, postoffice Enigma, Ga.
- The domicile is at Hattiesburg, Forrest County, Mississippi.
- Amount of capital stock Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars.
- The par value of shares is One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.
- The period of existence (not to exceed fifty years) is fifty (50) years.
- The purpose for which it is created is: To buy and sell lumber, cross-ties and any and all other products of timber for profit, either in wholesale lots or at retail, or both, and to operate and carry on the business of lumber and timber dealers generally; to engage in the manufacturing and marketing of lumber, cross-ties, turpentine and any and all other products of timber, and for that purpose may acquire, construct, own and operate a sawmill or saw mills, a planing mill or planing mills, tools and equipments for manufacturing cross-ties, a turpentine still or turpentine stills, and in connection with the operation of such saw mills, planing mills, manufacturing of cross-ties, and turpentine stills, may acquire, construct, own and operate tram roads, logging railroads, log roads and like roads, tool and machine shops and a store or stores; to engage in the business of buying, leasing and selling of real estate, timber and timber lands; and, for the purpose of doing and carrying on the above enumerated businesses, may own and operate, do and perform, all things necessary in the operation of the same.

The business of this corporation shall be under the management of a board of directors of not less than three persons, who shall be stockholders in the corporation. The board of directors shall be elected annually by the stockholders, and the board of directors shall enact such by-laws as may be necessary for the government of the corporation and may provide for and elect such officers as may be necessary and proper, and shall prescribe their duties and compensation. The first meeting of the parties interested in this corporation may be held at such time and place as may be

agreed upon by and between such parties, but if there shall be no such agreement, then and in that event the meeting shall be called and held in the manner prescribed and provided for by law.

Said corporation shall have the privilege of beginning business when Two Thousand Five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars of the capital stock shall have been subscribed for and paid to the treasurer of the same.

Said corporation shall have the privilege of establishing such branch offices in this state, for the conducting and carrying on of the aforesaid business and enterprises, as to it may seem proper.

8. The rights and powers that may be exercised by this corporation are those conferred by the provisions of Chapter 24, Mississippi Code, 1906.
