"The Devil," as you have learned, is a drama—rather, two of them, with two devils. With a pair of theatrical managers producing "The Devil" simultaneously, with both claiming the orthodox version, New York is certainly having a—well, a hot time, thank you.

Next week the Satanic invasion is to have an addition in the person of an alluring she-devil. Miss Gertrude Hoffman, who is now doing a "Salome" dance in a yard of mosquito netting, two wash pans and a smile, is to present the feminine conception of the Evil One and promises that it will be a warm number, as.

It may be said in behalf of Mr.

Mephistopheles that he is the most engaging character that has been seen in a New York theatre in many moons. And this goes as it lays whether applied to the cynically devilish Mr. Arlis at Flaks's theater, or Mr. Stevens, the devil of Mr. Savage's production. Choice between the rival devils is a matter of taste, but the Flaks Beelzebub, although not as Savage, has more fire.

Of course, "The Devil" is an European importation, and not a home-grown product. No American playwright, hemmed in by the capital, must always triumph in the last act could hope to produce anything so alluring and ingenious as has Ferenc Molnar, the Hungarian journalist who conceived "The Devil."

There isn't anything strikingly original in the plot. "The Devil" is a devil of a play, and not much more. There is a young woman, the wife of

and luxury and fine raiment on the other. He has convinced them, as he convinced Joan, that love is but a fond folly and that money is the only thing in life worth while. With a shaft of sarcasm he has pierced their bubbles of romance.

Later, when his advice has been acted upon, when the girl has discovered for herself the old truism that money cannot buy happiness and that a fat purse is but poor recompense for a fatness of wit, the devil again appears at the opportune moment—always at the opportune moment. Johnny-on-the-spotness is a characteristic of all the devils I have ever known, and the number is not few.

Then, with the lady safely married to a fat boob with a big bank account, and all the fat apparently in the fire, the devil reverses himself. A consistent devil would be unthinkable. He points out the joys and beauties of romance, the ecstasies of love, the deliriums of passion—all of those great emotions which the woman might have known, and has missed. He sneers at wealth, at conventions, at respectability, and declares the world well lost for love.

The devil's argument is as old as humanity, but to the listener it comes as a new and unique melody. The birthright of virtue to which she was born becomes a hateful nightmare, the mess of pottage is near at hand, human nature is weak and—what would you?

But after all, we cannot help a certain sneaking sympathy for this devil, an admiration that is akin to reverence. He is the incarnate spirit of protest which inhabits the souls of all of us. He is our double, our other side, our subconscious ego, perhaps kept always under control, but always seeking expression.

HONOR ATHLETES WHO WON LAURELS

New York August 29.—One of the greatest demonstrations that New York has known in years will be seen today to the American athletes who participated in the London Olympic games. A representative company of 500 New Yorkers, headed by Gwynne Vanderbilt, will well the Olympic gladiators.

There will be a parade, speeches and distribution of medals at the City Hall theater party at the New York City. The parade will go down Broadway to the City Hall. The line will be military, athletic and civic bodies.

At the ceremonies at the City Hall will be presented to each athlete a suitable testimonial, such as a medal, and three special prizes will be awarded. John J. Hayes, winner of the Marathon race, will receive a special silver cup; Carpenter, who was disqualified in the 400-meters run, will get a consolation cup, and Robert, who finished second in that event, will also receive a consolation cup.

One thousand children from public and parochial schools of the greater city, with 500 singers from the United States Societies, will sing the new song of "My Country 'Tis of Thee" at the termination of ten days of the Olympic ceremonies.
