THE MORMONS.—The New Era says—We learn by a gentleman from Warsaw that a meeting of the people of Hancock county has been called, to be held at Carthage, to take into consideration their relations with the Mormons. It is said that a good deal of excitement exists against them, and apprehension of a serious riot and outbreak were entertained. The people of that section of the State are as heartily tired of the Mormons as ever the Missourians were, but they have suffered them to obtain so strong a foothold that no power exists which can deprive them of their possessions, or induce them to abandon their present residence.

YUCATAN.

The last intelligence from this province, leads us to look for a renewal of hostilities with Mexico, at no very distant day. The Secretary of the Commissioners appointed to treat with Mexico, has returned to Merida with the terms proposed by Santa Anna. A passenger on the Forest, who arrived day before yesterday, informs us that the terms as proposed are as follows:

The Yucatecos are to collect their duties according to the present form, and their general interior regulations will be continued.

Their troops are to aid Santa Anna in foreign war, and he will retain some Mexican troops at Laguna.

We take it for granted the Yucatecos will not submit to these terms, and that Santa Anna will send his troops down on them again. In connection a man of war had arrived at Campeachy before the Forest sailed, with dispatches. What was the nature of these dispatches, no one knew, but it was generally believed that the mission was not a specific one, certainly not, if the Yucatecos seemed inclined to reject terms proposed.—*N O Tropic Ad.*

A correspondent of the Arkansas Intelligencer, writing from Bayou Menard, a few miles from Fort Gibson, on the 25th July says: A rumor has reached Fort Gibson that the detachment of Dragoons under Capt Boone, which left that post some weeks since, on an incursion in the western prairies, has been heard from, and that they are suffering dreadfully. The weather had been excessively hot, several of the men had died, many more were sick and unable to travel. The flies in countless myriads were so bad on the horses that they were completely broken down, and the Captain, in consequence of all these difficulties, had been compelled to encamp some two hundred and fifty miles west of this, and remain until his men and horses had recruited sufficiently to enable him to get back. This information was received through some Creek Indians.

Mormon Outrage.—The Jacksonville Illinoian of the 19th ult. says—A gentleman of this town, who has just returned

from a visit to Carthage, states that considerable excitement exists in Hancock county on account of a gross outrage committed by holy Joe Smith, upon the Collector of that county.

It seems that Joe had taken offence at the collector on account of the manner in which he had discharged his duty in reference to some of the Prophet's lots in Nauvoo; and during a recent visit of the collector to that city, he was attacked and cruelly beaten by Joe in presence of several hundred of his faithful. The collector had been quite ill for some weeks, and was scarcely able to travel at the time the outrage was perpetrated. From the statement, we shall not be surprised to hear of Joe's sudden disappearance shortly.

The Missouri Sentinel of the 16th inst. says: Mr. Thomas Cumly, and the horse upon which he was riding were found dead in the prairie, about five miles south of this place on Friday, the 18th inst. It is believed that they were killed by lightning during the storm of the day previous. He has left a family to deplore his loss.

Another Brave Old Oak Fallen.—James Draper, one of the stout hearts of '76, died at Warrenton, Ga., on the 14th ult., aged 83. He entered the army when only 18 years of age, and was with Gen. Green at the battle of Guilford Court House, and in many other engagements during the war.
