## Letter From Miss Gean

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 9, 1915.

Dear Friends:  
It has been several days since I have told you anything about my trip. Our reception on the night of the third was beautiful. The people were grand to us. There was something like three or four hundred altogether and the Mississippians were the ones of interest to be sure. The music was grand and the refreshments also. Saturday, Sept. 4th, was Mississippi day and we had quite a nice program that day too. The band music was great, they played several of our favorite pieces before we left. We had several good speeches by noted men. On Sunday a bunch of us took a trip out to the beautiful ocean and played with the waves for an hour or two.

On Monday night we left for Los Angeles and arrived here about 5 P. M. Tuesday, On Wednesday morning we took in Pasadena and the ostrich farm Pasadena is said to be one of the most beautiful places in America and I have no doubt as to the truth of the statement for I have never seen a place more beautiful. Busch's sunken gardens are of interest too. We saw a wonderfully beautiful home in Pasadena that all people who chew Wrigleys Spearment gum donated.

The ostrich farm was of great interest. They have there about 550 ostrich. Some are tiny little fellows only a few days old.

In the afternoon we went out to the beach and went in wading and swimming—some got a good ducking, of course, and I was among the number. The salt water did not taste like our fresh water in Tombigbee and other streams, however it was delightful to take a plunge in and we had a good time for an hour or two. A bunch went out to a play called "The Mission Play" last night, I was not in the crowd who went. It was about 14 miles out and some of us were too tired to go. A large party of us are going over to Catalina Islands today and tonight we are to have another reception of some kind. Tomorrow, which is Friday Sept. 10, we leave here and will stop over in El Paso for something like a day and from there to New Orleans and then we scatter out and each one goes their nearest way home.

I neglected to tell you about the beautiful orange orchards we saw in Pasadena. They were indeed beautiful and we all felt like it would have been hard not to have broken one of the ten commandment if we had had an opportunity to have pulled a few oranges.

We are all eager to get back to dear old Mississippi and some are real home sick. I am only giving a few details of our trip. It is impossible to tell one half the things we have seen on our round. It is indeed a grand trip.
