ELECTION NOTICE.

In accordance with law a General Election will be held in Panola county

On November the 5th, 1872.

For the purpose of electing Electors for President and Vice-President of the United States and one Representative in Congress for Second Congressional District of the State. The said General Election will be held each Precinct in the county as follows:

Pleasant Mount one box. Inspectors: Hagen Sanders, J. D. Montgomery, George Brant. Clerks: William Hill, Nathan Hays.

Special Attention is directed to Article Section 367 of the Revised Code.

Section 367. All places for retailing intoxicating liquors, in the several counties in this State, shall be closed, and no intoxicating liquors permitted to be sold, bartered, or given away, or drunk at any store, saloon, tavern, restaurant, steamboat not running, or wharf, boat at a landing, or place of business, from twelve o'clock of the preceding night, to twelve o'clock of the succeeding night, of a general or special election; and all intoxicated rioters or disorderly persons, disturbing the peace by noise or violence, in the city, town or place where the election shall be held, shall be arrested, placed in jail, or otherwise in custody (being permitted while in such custody to vote), until the polls shall be closed, or until they are entirely sober, quiet, orderly, peaceable and well behaved; and registrars and inspectors of the election hereby made conservators of the peace at the precinct; and all such conservators of the peace, sheriffs, and their deputies, and all police officers appointed to guard, or be present at the polls and place of election, city marshals, the deputies, and all other police and peace officers are required to faithfully execute these provisions and others; to preserve the peace, freedom and purity of elections, under the penalty prescribed in the penal code for any neglect, such duties and said registrars or inspectors shall, when necessary, call upon any or all citizens to aid them in these requirements; and persons informed of any neglect or violation of these requirements, shall give notice to the chief attorney and other proper officers thereof. A space of thirty feet in every direction from the polls shall be kept open and clear of persons, except two challengers, of good conduct and good behavior, selected by each party to detect and challenge illegal voters; and voters shall approach the polls from one direction, line, or door, or passage, and depart another, as nearly opposite as convenient. Copy of this section shall be published and posted, with the notice of any general or special election.

Special attention is also called to the following section of the Registration Law.

Sec. 354. The Board of Registration, in matters pertaining to their registration, shall be conservators of the peace, and empowered to arrest and cause to be imprisoned in county jail, when necessary, all persons obstructing or preventing their registration, intimidating, threatening, or fraudulently endeavoring to prevent any person entitled therefrom registration, creating riots, disturbances or quarrels at the place of registration, otherwise interfering therewith to prevent delay the registrars in the discharge of their duty; and all such offenses shall be punished misdemeanors under the Criminal Code, and said registrars are empowered to call upon sheriffs, constables, and their deputies, and other peace officers, and, when necessary, all citizens, to aid and assist them in enforcing the laws and public peace, and suppress disturbances and prevent the offenses enumerated; and this section shall be published and posted with every notice to hold a registration.
