Call for Jackson County Democratic Delegate Convention.

A Democratic delegate convention of Jackson county is called to meet at 12 o'clock, noon, June 4, 1904, in the court house, for the purpose of selecting three delegates from Jackson county to the State convention to meet at Jackson, Miss., on the 15th day of June, 1904; also to choose a new Democratic executive committee for Jackson county. None but white Democrats are allowed to vote in selecting county delegates. Each supervisor's district is allowed ten delegates in the county convention, apportioned as follows, to be elected on the 28th day of May, 1904: Helveston, 6 delegates; Wards, 4; Oak Grove, 6; Jones, 4; Escatawpa, 1; Moss Point, 3; East Side, 1; Pascagoula, 1; Orange Grove, 1; West Pascagoula, 1; Scranton, 3; Florida, 1; Jacobs, 1; Vancleave, 3; Ocean Springs, 4; Daisy, 6; Reeves, 4.
