PEOPLE'S PARTY CANDIDATE.

Heavy rains in West Texas have swollen the San Saba river higher than ever known. At Menardville twelve houses were swept away and four people were drowned. Twenty-five lives were lost in that section.

Heat caused the death of 19 persons in New York and vicinity Thursday. The temperature along the north and Middle Atlantic seaboard is hotter than it has been for years. 102 degrees is general.

Mr. C. W. Quin is announced in the Gazette today as a candidate for supervisor in the first district, subject to nomination by the democrats in primary election. Mr. Quin lives near Holmesville, in the northern part of the district, and is an intelligent, industrious, enterprising business man. UNABLE TO CANVASS.

At present he is confined at home by his physician who assures him that in eight or ten days he will be able to again enter the canvass. AMITE POPULISTS.

Pursuant to the call of the chairman of the people's party executive committee of Amite county, a mass meeting was held in Liberty June 5. After being called to order, J. A. Burriss was elected chairman and W. D. Hazlewood, secretary. The following committee on resolutions was appointed: E. A. Bates, W. H. Griffin, M. V. B. Newman and I. A. Jenkins; said committee submitted this report, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we, the people's party of Amite county, deem it unwise at this time to nominate a ticket, but we still declare our allegiance to the principles of the people's party believing as we do that there is no hope for the masses save through a reform party.

A CASE OF SMALL POX.

A case of small pox was discovered in a negro shanty in "Pleasant Run," a suburban portion of Summit, last Tuesday. A negro man by the name of Sol Barnes, who has been working with the railroad gang between Terry and Crystal Springs visited here, and took sick with the disease while here. He was attended by Dr. Simmons, who called Dr. Sample in consultation, and the disease was diagnosed as small pox. Last Tuesday night the negro was moved to the pest house, a mile northwest of town, a locality completely isolated; guards placed around the place, and a nurse furnished. There is no danger whatever of any outsider contracting the disease. No alarm, fright or scare in the least was manifested by the public as full confidence is reposed in the town authorities and board of health to successfully cope with it. The board of health of the county health officer, Dr. Aubrey Quin, has taken every necessary precaution, and they apprehend no danger whatever of its spreading further, but expect to stamp it out with the termination of this case. —Summit Sentinel.

THE MAGNOLIA FLOWERS.

Editor Gazette: Passing through the Tangipahoa swamp yesterday I saw a fine, stately magnolia tree, the eastern side of which faced a road and field beyond, and the sun, as he came out from his morning rising, threw his beams till noon upon the eastern front of the tree, and all that portion of it was covered with the grand white flowers, the Magnolia Grande Floras. These gilded all that portion of the tree, and made it look at a distance as though a gang of swans had found refuge there. Just west of the same tree, there stands a magnificent beech, so full of grateful foliage that it almost obscures all the western portion of the magnolia, and hides it from the beams of the sun, keeping it in shade from noon till night. On this the western portion of the tree not a flower was there blooming. Its outer surface was equally well adorned with foliage, but not a flower was there blooming, and all because it was not in touch, en rapport with Nature's sun. Thus while the eastern front was adorned with flowers white as the Camelia, only leaves bedecked its western side, that was out of fellowship with the king of day, and so the tree flowered but on one side.

NEMO.

The Kirksville, Mo., cyclone disaster, says an exchange, brings about another one of those cases where a childless wife and husband died simultaneously, and the question is, who are the heirs, her people or his? The same thing happened when the Burgoyne went down, and has been frequently a subject of contest in English courts. The English courts have usually held that in a sea disaster the man, being the stronger, is supposed to live the longer, and consequently the property goes to his heirs. But such a conclusion does not strike one as being particularly sound. It is best to take the ground that both died at the same time and divide the property. Almost \$100,000 is involved in the Kirksville case.
