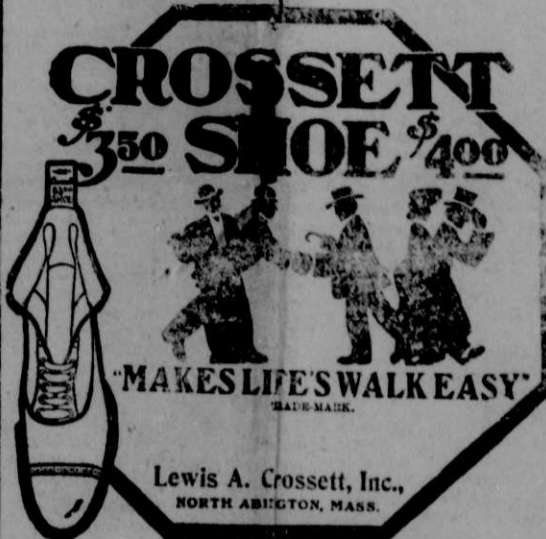

Chief Engineer Stevens, of the "Gold Brick" Canal Commission, has announced that his first attention upon assuming his new duties will be devoted to the mosquito. Remarkable indeed! If the Chief Engineer must assume control of the sanitary work upon the Isthmus, then will some one kindly inform us what the duties of the health board are? If Engineer Stevens must spend his time investigating the mosquito, while other members of the commission are involved in pretty quarrels and all running after red tape, and while the half-paid American employees are leaving Panama in disgust or bought off by the trans-continental railroads, then who is going to look after the actual construction work upon the canal? Who is moving the dirt? All well informed men know that the substitution of the Panama route for the Niagara route, which was accomplished by Mark Hanna in the United States Senate, was a distinct victory for the transcontinental railroads, whose owners vastly prefer the Panama route in the events, the warning which was sounded by the Democratic Senators at the time of this change becomes most significant. The Republicans were told that this change of routes was intended to defeat the building of a canal. The discovery has been made that every important canal official selected by President Roosevelt has come from among the officials of the transcontinental railroads, Engineer Stevens being the last man to deprive those benevolent corporations of his valuable services.

ANOTHER STEAL

In a short time the country will probably hear a great deal about another "constructive recess" a "mileage steal," as President Roosevelt has again announced that congress will be convened in extra session on November 11th, about three weeks in advance of the regular session. As this is to be a "long" session, with no "age limit" prescribed, the necessity for this short extra session is not made apparent to the ordinary mind, and in the night of Mr. Roosevelt's last extra session, the question very naturally arises—will there be another "constructive recess" for the purpose of robbing the national Treasury of a sum approximating \$200,000? This scheme was originated at the last session Congress by Mr. Elihu Root, now Secretary of State, and this "constructive recess" occurred between noon of one day and noon of the same day, at the expiration of the extra session and the beginning of the regular session, and although the members did not leave the hall of representatives, an effort was made to vote themselves extra mileage fees, the "constructive recess" being declared for that purpose. The scheme received the endorsement of the President, and notice of Mr. Roosevelt's intention to call congress in extra session on November 11th has given rise to the belief that the mileage steal is to be again attempted.

A Washington dispatch to the Picayune says that Secretary Wilson's resignation at any time will occasion no surprise. "No one familiar with Roosevelt's methods," when this taker of rebates left the cabinet to throw the protecting wing over the equitable policy holders he carried with him Mr. Roosevelt's "I hereby certify that he is honest." When public sentiment demanded that Loomis leave the state department, the President assigned him the important duty of inspecting the American consulates in Europe, and the President now has Attorney General Moody traveling over the country trying to explain the "Roosevelt method."

Edgar H. Farrar and E. D. Saunders two prominent citizens of New Orleans expressing their views through The Times-Democrat, demanded that the grand jury thoroughly investigate the charge that the health authorities refused to promptly report the appearance of yellow fever in that city.
