TWO KILLED AND FOUR WOUNDED IN A FEUD FIGHT.

Regular Battle Between the Newman and Prichard Factions at Meadville, Miss.

Dr. A. M. Newman and Silas Reynolds Are Killed—Lenox Newman, Ernest Newman, Herbert Applewhite. — Boyd Wounded.

Meadville, Miss., June 14.—The Newman-Prichard feud broke out again this afternoon, and after a pitched battle on the main street the casualties were:

THE DEAD.

Dr. A. M. Newman, Chancery Clerk and leader of his clan. Silas Reynolds, allied with Prichards.

FATALLY WOUNDED

Herbert Applewhite, lawyer, allied with Prichards. Lenox Newman, son of the doctor, brother of Dr. A. M. Newman.

Boyd, allied with Prichards, shot in the head.

Attorney Luther Whittington, who was here at the time of the battle, and, being familiar with all the conditions, got into communication with Judge M. H. Wilkinson, at Brookhaven, and urged him to

have the Governor send troops to preserve order, as it was feared that by nightfall the clans would gather and a battle royal be fought.

Company H. arrived here to night from Brookhaven, and two more companies are on the way. Judge Wilkinson and District Attorney Wall also arrived here late to night.

The presence of the militia has had a quieting effect, especially upon those who have nothing to do with the feud, but were afraid they might be drawn into one side or the other.

Dr. Newman who always went heavily armed, was driving in his buggy down the main street this afternoon, about 3 o'clock, and as he passed the Butler Building a shot was fired at him from the second story window. He jumped out of his buggy and got out of range under a shed. As he reached this place he was met with Applewhite and Reynolds and some other joined Reynolds and Applewhite and a regular pitched battle with Winchester and revolvers was fought out to a finish. When the smoke had cleared away it was found that nearly every one who had participated in the fight was wounded. Dr. Newman had evidently been killed by Applewhite, while Dr. Newman had killed Reynolds before himself succumbing to the half a dozen wounds which showed on his body.
