ADVICE TO FARM BOYS AND GIRLS

Club Work Is Important Because It Has Such Large Possibilities, Says Secretary.

LEARN TO BEST ADVANTAGE

Department of Agriculture and Others Endeavoring to Make Farms of Country More Profitable and Home Life Pleasant.

I want to say just a few words to the farm boys and girls, and the older people need not bother to read it at all. Now, you and I know that the boys' and girls' club work represents one of the most important lines of agricultural activity in the United States today. I believe it is important, because it has such large possibilities. We men and women who are trying to improve farming and farm life will be out of the game when you boys and girls are just reaching the prime of life. You have the advantage of us because you are learning the principles of good agriculture and home-making while you are still young enough to learn to the best advantage.

and to apply in a practical way the knowledge thus gained throughout your whole lives.

Accomplishing Much Good.
Even as boys and girls you are accomplishing more good than can be measured. The good that you will be able to do will increase as you grow older and, when you become full-grown men and women, you can supply for the agricultural forces of this nation a leadership such as the world has never known before.

I congratulate the boys and girls club members. And I would like to ask a favor of the boys and girls who are not members of the clubs. We are trying—the United States department of agriculture, the state agricultural colleges, and a great many other people—to make the farms of this country more profitable and home life on the farm more pleasant. I wish the rest of you boys and girls would join with those who are already members of the clubs and help us in accomplishing this great service for our common country. It is a patriotic thing to do; and it is a service that cannot be rendered by anybody except you boys and girls.

Biggest Year in History.
The year 1920 should be the biggest year in the history of boys' and girls' club work, and I am confident that it will be. The country is facing a difficult situation, because so many men have left the farms to work in the city. The good work that the club boys and girls can do will help to overcome that handicap, and the club boys and girls will do that kind of work this year. It may hear you to know that many of us here in the department of agriculture look upon the boys' and girls' clubs such as Caesar must have looked upon the Tenth Legion or Napoleon upon the Old Guard. The other forces may fail, but we know that we can rely on you.

I might not be willing to see you undertake such serious service if I did not know that, while you work hard, you play joyously together. I am sure that the boys and girls in the clubs have better times than the boys and girls who are not in the clubs, and that is an additional compensation to you for the hard work you do in the club work.

KEEP OFF HARMFUL RABBITS

Trunks Painted With Mixture of Coal Tar and Creosote Oil Will Discourage Rodents.

Where rabbits are likely to gnaw young fruit trees, paint the trunks with a mixture of coal tar and creosote oil. Use two-thirds to three-fourths heavy coal tar and balance of creosote oil, or enough to thin it to the consistency of thick paint. These materials can be bought at paint stores. A paint brush with stiff bristles which are pretty well worn down is best to apply the tar. It is said that rabbits will not gnaw trees which have been painted with this mixture. It is the best paint to use on pruning cuts or wounds.

Most Rapid Growing Vine.
The wild cucumber vine is one of the most rapid growing annual vines that may be used for a trellis or to cover up unsightly places.

Important in Planting.
It is important in setting a plant in the garden to firm the soil thoroughly about the tips of the roots. Leave the top inch of soil loose.

Garden Full of Crops.
The good garden is the one that is full of spring, midsummer and fall crops growing and ripening continually in abundance.

PRICES FROM SALES IN MARKET REPORTS

Predictions As to Probable Future Figures Not Given.

Not Possible to Give Quotations on Car Lots Because No Basis to Ascertain Price—Most Interest in Jobbing Trade.

The prices quoted in market reports, supplied by bureau of markets, United States department of agriculture, represent actual sales, not prices asked or quotations given, or predictions as to probable future prices. Hence it may be that on a rising market the prices quoted may seem low when the reports are received, and vice versa, on a declining market the prices may be high by the time the reports are received.

Quotations usually represent the condition of the respective markets up to approximately 9 a. m., local time, but reports are not issued until about noon. Consequently it is impossible to include fluctuations which may occur between these hours, in the market reports.

In many important markets it would be impossible to get car lot quotations because very few or no cars are sold intact by the original car lot receiver in that market to the local jobbers, hence there would be no basis for actual sales upon which to report a car lot price. In most important markets, however, there is a fairly defined jobbing trade which buys at the prevailing jobbing price for the day.

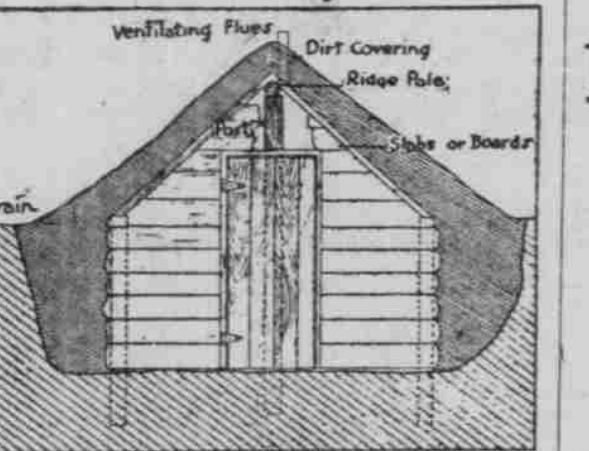
Returns to a grower or shipper who may have consigned a shipment to a commission merchant are usually made on a basis of the jobbing price received from which, of course, freight, commission, and other expenses are subtracted. Hence shippers of consigned products are usually more interested in the jobbing prices prevailing in a given market than in car lot prices quotations.

STORAGE OF FOOD PRODUCTS

Cellar of House Should Hold Winter's Supply of Various Kinds of Fruit and Vegetables.

Farm buildings usually offer ample space for the storage of food products raised on the farm. The cellar of the house should hold a winter's supply of potatoes, beets, carrots, onions, and canned fruits and vegetables, as well as such articles as a barrel of salt pork, keg of kraut, and jar of eggs in water glass. The thrifty farmer faces the winter season with a well-stocked cellar and with a store of dried fruits and vegetables and possibly some jars of apple butter in his attic.

Specially constructed root cellars, or "caves," may be found on some farms. Potatoes and other vegetables are sometimes carried over the winter in

earth pits, or "tumps." The barn may also serve as a storage place for vegetables. For more information write the United States department of agriculture, Washington, D. C.

TO AID RASPBERRY GROWERS

Specialists to Make Thorough Investigation of Diseases in Middle West Region.

Raspberry growers, particularly in the lake region of the middle West, have encountered difficulties resulting from diseases not thoroughly understood that have seemed to threaten the existence of the industry, unless effective methods of control be worked out. The United States department of agriculture has been investigating the situation for some time past and is about to begin more intensive studies. Specialists will spend practically the entire season in the field, thoroughly investigating the disease to determine the causes and habits of growth and to devise control measures by spraying and otherwise.

AID FARM BUREAU CAMPAIGN

Connecticut Boys Given Purebred Holstein Calves for Fine Work in Behalf of Bureau.

Boy and girl club members secured more than half the farm bureau memberships in a drive made in Fairfield county, Connecticut.

The quota for the town of Fairfield was 25 members. Raymond Banks, a member of the boys' and girls' club in that town, secured 100 members.

In North Fairfield, whose quota was 12, Leon Ryvoit, another club boy, obtained 50 memberships.

Because of the fine work which they did in behalf of the farm bureau, each boy was given a purebred Hereford calf—and thus became the envy of all the other boy and girl club members in Fairfield county.

Ashes Supply Lime.
Wood ashes supply a large amount of lime, as they are composed of about half lime. This is needed in the orchard probably as much as the potash in many cases.

Dull Tools Discourage.
Nothing is more discouraging than pruning orchards with dull tools, because it wastes time and is the large factor in the expense of orchard management.

STYLES PROGRESS IN UNDERTHINGS



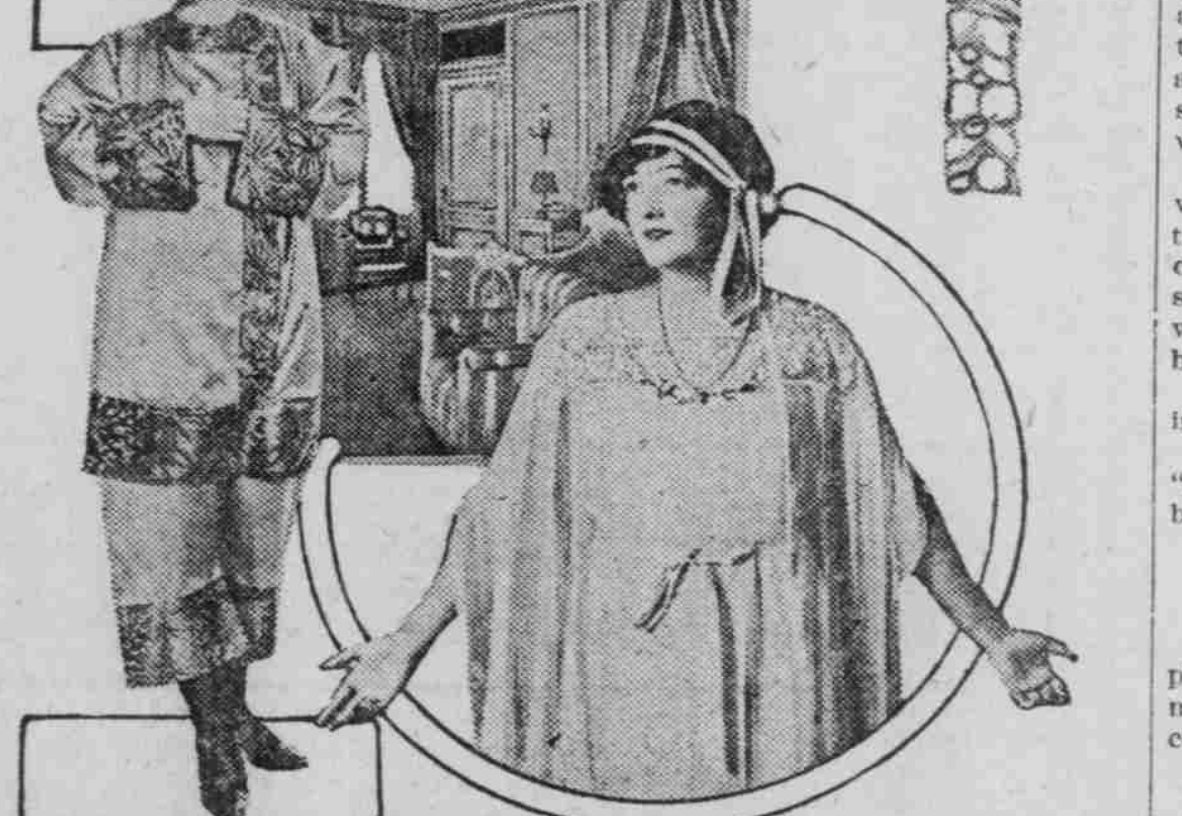
GENTLE women have always appreciated all the little subtle touches that are the essentials of good dressing. In days gone by our grandmothers learned the art of embroidery and occupied many hours of their time doing painstaking and beautiful work on their belongings. They replenished their store of underthings with dainty hand-made pieces, adding refinements to them in embroidery and other stitching. Underwear of fine cottons, decorated with exquisite embroideries, is as much admired as ever, but most of it is made in other lands than ours.

Meantime styles in underthings progress. They have not grown any less dainty but they have become more luxurious. Wash silks and satins, laces and even chiffons have been added to the materials used for making them and ribbons have replaced embroidery. The camisole petticoat and boudoir mantle pictured here reflect the mode in luxurious and beautiful underthings of silk which has eclipsed cotton in the favor of many fair women.

If it were not for embellishments of ribbon our underwear of today would be uninteresting and tame. No matter whether of silk or cotton it is all designed with reference to ribbon decorations and no manufacturer could hope for any success who failed to reckon with ribbon. Lingerie bows, flower forms and ornaments that are detachable are taken as a matter of course in the wardrobe of today.

The petticoat pictured is made of white wash satin and finished at the bottom edge with a border of lace. Deep scalloped pieces with bound edges are set on instead of a flounce and headed with a band of lace insertion. Small flowerlike rosettes made of narrow pink ribbon are set at the top and bottom of the scallop. The camisole is made of a filmy lace with narrow satin ribbon simulating flowers applied to it. The same ribbon supplies the shoulder straps and makes the little blossoms set on where they join the body. Wider ribbon with a picot edge takes care of the adjustment at the waist and supplies a pretty bow and ends for a finish. By such means the much-occupied women of today contrive to have those delicate underthings that are essential to perfect dress.

INDOOR DRESS NOW GOES TROUSERWARD



NEGLIGEEs patterned after the garb of Chinese women are developing popularity at a rate that promises to make them rivals of the kimono. They prove to be comfortable, practical and unexpectedly becoming—especially to small women. Other skirtless models reveal a trouser-ward trend in boudoir clothes, as is apparent in any representative display of such garments. Turkish trousers of satin or even of silk and metal tissues, over low bodices, form the foundation for long, loose coats of crepe georgette or chiffon. In the showiest and most splendid examples of negligees; so there is plenty of precedent for the Chinese garments of much less magnificence, although nearly all of these are fashioned in silk or satin which is more than fine enough.

An excellent example of indoor dress of Chinese inspiration is shown in the figure at the left of the two pictured above. It is of plain, deep blue satin bordered with broadened satin in which color appear with green, henna and blue figuring in the composition. Nothing could be much easier to put together than this cheerful negligee.

At the right, crepe de chine and georgette make an equally simple indoor dress having a straight chemise slip of the heavier material and an over garment of lace and georgette, with square neck that allows it to slip over the head. A ribbon girle and small spray of ribbon flowers acquit themselves perfectly as finishing touches. A bandeau of ribbons on the head is substituted for a boudoir cap and proves an advantage in the direction of dignity.

Very pretty negligees of lightweight brocaded satins and in novelty crepe de chine are among the latest addition to indoor clothes. They are usually cut like long, loose and slightly draped coats with long shawl collars that are a froth of lace frills and organdie. Bandoaux of frills and ribbon, with tiny chiffon roses for trimming, correspond with the collar and complete the daintiest and most easily put on of negligees, as they fasten with a single ornament (of chiffon roses) below the waistline. They look much like an opera cape in outline.

Fastens in Center Back.
The blouse that fastens in the center back is the favorite of the moment. Many of these blouses are finished at the neck in front with old-fashioned frills, either gathered or accordion plaited, of white net, or organdie when the blouse proper is shown in color, or vice versa.

A Plain Petticoat.
The straight petticoat composed of two widths of material turned over at the top to allow of an elastic band one inch wide being inserted is a thing which even the most inexperienced sewer can make. Fasten the elastic with a non-rusting hook and eye. If you make the petticoat of washing material, take out the elastic when it goes to the laundry, as it perishes in water. The petticoat should not be more than one yard and three-quarters round the hem.
