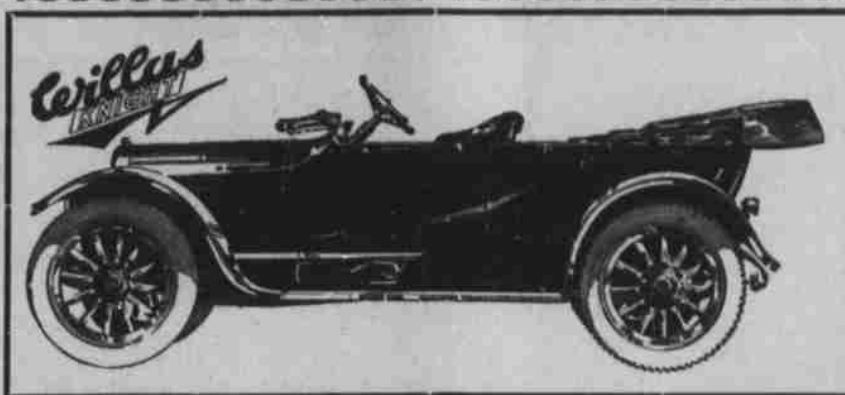

TO GRAVEL RIDGE ROAD IN AUGUST OR SEPTEMBER

City Council Will Ask for Bids to
Gravel Streets Leading to
Ridge Road.

A petition signed by citizens from
all parts of the city was presented to
the Council last week asking that
the thoroughfare from Mr. H. H.
Brickell's residence to Adcock's store,
at the city limits, be improved with
gravel pavement. The petition was
received and the request therein
granted.

An order was entered directing the
City Clerk to advertise for bids for
the hauling of the necessary mate-
rial to do this work. It was stated
that the haul would be short and that
the cost would be comparatively low
on the completion of the work. Bids
will be opened at a special meeting
to be held July 30.

The roadway to be improved con-
stitutes one block of Perry Street be-
tween Washington and Monroe, and
Monroe Street from Perry to Ridge

Road, and thence Ridge Road to Ad-
cock's store.

The people living just out of the
city limits on Ridge Road, in consid-
eration of the work to be done by the
city, promise to gravel a section of
Ridge Road lying in the vicinity of
their property, thus extending the
paving a considerable distance be-
yond the boundary line.

of this road and the employment of
the teams and workmen elsewhere, it
was decided that this work could be
done during the month of August or
not later than the month of Septem-
ber.

Mr. J. H. Bunch Asks Voters For Another Term

STANDS ON HIS RECORD, TO WHICH HE POINTS WITH PARDON-
ABLE PRIDE, AND SOLICITS YOUR CARE-
FUL CONSIDERATION.

To My Friends and the Voters Gen-
erally Throughout Yazoo County:
It is "sorter" apt to flustrate a
fellow when a man "slips up on the
blind side of you," as my good friend
in the lower end of the county seems
to have done in the matter of enter-
ing the race for Circuit Clerk. But
after fully recovering from the shock,
I am ready for the fray, and may the
best man win.

Now, please don't misunderstand
me. The office of Circuit Clerk be-
longs to you—the voters of Yazoo
County—and it is your privilege and
your duty to bestow it upon the man
who, in your judgment, is best fitted
to properly discharge its duties.

Inasmuch as the election is only a
few days off, and no one had announ-
ced for the place, I of course have
made no canvass of the county for re-
election, and will appreciate the sup-
port of my friends throughout the
county.

Perhaps, after all, it is better that
the lack of time will make a canvass
of the county unnecessary. No doubt
the people throughout the county have
been sufficiently entertained by the
various candidates for the last several
months. Even if I were to personally
see every voter in the county, the
only claim I could make for the office
would be my official record as your
clerk for the last two terms, and this,
I believe, is well known to most of the
voters who have had occasion to ob-
serve the workings of the Circuit
Court during my incumbency. And it
is upon this record that I now make
my appeal for your support.

I hope that if you are not familiar
with my official record that you will
take the time and trouble to make a
careful investigation of it. Ask any
local lawyer, or any Judge who has sat
upon the Bench in this district since
I have been your Clerk, and I believe
they will tell you that I have so kept
the records and looked after the de-
tails of the office as to expedite the
business of the court, and thus save
valuable time, which means decreased

cost to every tax-payer who helps to
pay the expense of running the court.
I am perfectly willing that your
judgment shall be made up from the
testimony of these gentlemen, to
whom I refer without previous con-
sent, knowing that they will give you
the facts as they are.

While I have tried faithfully and
conscientiously to discharge the duties
of the office of Circuit Clerk, I have
felt that whatever service I could ren-
der to the people of Yazoo County
outside the mere routine of the office,
should be cheerfully given, and this
I have done, always, and will con-
tinue to do, should you see fit to give
me another term.

"Practice makes perfect" is an old
saying with much in it. In a clerical
position of this sort, involving a
great deal to the tax-payers, it is es-
sential that the work should be look-
ed after by one of known ability in
work of this kind. I feel that my two
terms in this office have given me
valuable experience that will be worth
a great deal to the tax-payers by
continuing me in office for another
term. The experience thus gained
will be used in the dispatch of the
business of the court, hence in the in-
terests of the tax-payers who provide
the money for its operation.

As the short time between now and
the primary will make it impossible
to see the voters throughout the coun-
ty you will consider this a personal
solicitation for your vote and in-
fluence. I will appreciate it if my
friends will look after my interests at
each box in the county, and any as-
sistance that may be rendered in this
way will put me under lasting obliga-
tions. The people of Yazoo County
have been good to me in the past, and
I want to assure them that I feel
deeply grateful for it.

I leave my case in your hands, and
will abide by your decision, whatever
it may be.

communicated with him in my life. I

the king's bench division of the
English high court, that political fak-
ers would leave my name alone. It
was a very painful experience for a
Mississippian to hear his State held
up to ridicule in an English court
through the outrageous folly of its
Governor. I am not for Bilbo, but I
am certain any change from the
Brewer faction is bound to be a bless-
