## SIDEBOTHAM GAVE BUTTE LAWYER BUNCH OF STOCK

L. H. Haven Tells Jury in the Northwestern Trustee Case of Deal That Netted Him \$1,650 Without Investment. Galen Fined for Contempt.

Helena, Jan. 16.—Because A. J. Galen, of counsel for A. M. Alderson and W. C. Rae in the so-called Northwestern Trustee company case, persisted in registering an objection in the federal court this morning after Judge Bourquin had ruled on the question, he was fined \$100 by the court, but just before the noon recess Judge Bourquin suspended the fine, saying that he desired to fully protect the rights of his client.

At the time of the morning session was taken up largely with reading the minutes of the various meetings at which the organization of the company was perfected and which the prosecution expects to show was a part of the conspiracy to use the mails for fraudulent purposes.

Gave Him Stock and Option.

L. H. Haven, a Butte attorney, was under cross-examination by Judge H. C. Smith later. The witness said he was a director of the company from April to August, 1912. He said that when he got into the company he was associated with J. H. Davies of Butte in the law business and that one night Davies and Sidebotham had a discussion, called attention to practices in the early history of the company, which he said would show guilt of the defendants. Early stock owned by W. C. Rae, he said, was purchased on notes payable at option. Other such notes, he said, were held by the company as assets. He said he would show that J. W. Spear, Alderson and Rae were advertised by the company as prominent stockholders when in fact Rae and Alderson only owned one paid up share of stock and that Spear had paid nothing for stock held by him. Governor Stewart and Senator J. E. Burlingame of Cascade county, the district attorney said, were advertised as stockholders, when in truth they were not. Mr. Wheeler told the jury he expects to prove that Sidebotham and Wilmot, organizers of the company, voted themselves stock when they had no assets in the firm.

Louis E. Haven, the government's first witness, served as director and secretary of the company shortly after its organization. He identified the record book of minutes of early meetings.

EIGHT MORE INDICTED IN CHICAGO GRAFT CASE

Chicago, Jan. 16.—Eight indictments, according to announcement from the state's attorney's office, were voted today against men involved in the police graft investigation which recently led to the arrest of former Chief of Police C. C. Healey, other police officers and various alleged go-betweens, accused of aiding in collecting tribute from the underworld.

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## POSTOFFICE BILL IS PASSED IN HOUSE

Regular Appropriations for the Pneumatic Tube Service in Cities Sustained.

Washington, Jan. 16.—The regular appropriations for the present pneumatic tube postal service in New York, Brooklyn, Philadelphia, Boston, Chicago and St. Louis were again sustained in the house today when the postoffice appropriation bill came up for final action by a vote of 193 to 153.

After rejecting amendments by Representative Randall of California to prohibit the use of the mails for liquor advertisements in any form, the bill was passed in the same form in which it was completed last Saturday, without the proposed increase in second-class mail rates, penny postage or increase of pay to postal employees.

TRAFFIC RESUMED.

No one was injured and traffic was resumed this afternoon on the Northern Pacific main line west of Butte after a delay of several hours because of the derailment of an ore car on westbound freight No. 833, due out of Butte at 3 a. m. The cause of the accident was due to a burned-out journal box. The freight was halted three miles east of Deer Lodge this morning.

## SUCCESSFUL TO INJURY RECEIVED IN CAVEIN

John L. Forbes Fails to Survive the Shock of Amputation.

John L. Forbes, 21, died this afternoon at a local hospital from effects of injuries received on Dec. 27 at the Speculator mine. Coroner Lane ordered the body removed to the Richards' establishment and will hold an inquest the latter part of the week. The body will be shipped to Deer Lodge for interment at a date to be announced later.

Forbes had been in Butte but two months when he was hurt. He came here from Deer Lodge, where his father and mother still reside, and secured work at the Speculator. In the cave-in in which he was caught his right arm was crushed in such manner that amputation above the knee was found necessary. He failed to survive this.

The deceased was a native of Iowa and was a resident of this state for eight or nine years. With his wife, he lived at 462 East Broadway in Butte.

STAGE MUSICAL COMEDY AT HILL CITY CHURCH

Final arrangements for the staging of the "New Minister," the play given before Christmas by the choir of the Trinity Methodist church which attracted so much favorable comment, have been made to put on the performance at the Mount Bethel Methodist church in Walkerville next Friday night. He says that the members of the cast have been working hard to better their parts and the cast will be the same as in the previous play.

The money will be used by the choirs of each church to meet general expenses incurred by the two organizations.

Mrs. Anna Mattson, aged 42 years and a native of Finland, was ordered committed to Warm Springs this afternoon by Judge John V. Dwyer after she had undergone a medical examination at the hands of Dr. J. E. Cowperthwaite and Dr. W. C. Matthews. The woman had been in an unbalanced condition of mind for upwards of a year and a half, according to the testimony of people living in her locality.

## ADMIRAL TO INVESTIGATE WRECK OF MILWAUKEE

Caperton Takes Charge of Investigation at Eureka, Where Ships Are Ashore.

Eureka, Cal., Jan. 16.—Admiral Caperton, commander of the fleet, arrived off here today on the flagship San Diego to investigate the stranding of the cruiser Milwaukee on the beach north of here last Sunday while attempting to salvage the marine H-3. Navy officers said there was no chance to save the cruiser since Dec. 14. The Milwaukee, commanded by Lieut. W. F. Newton, was with other naval vessels, the vessel salvaging her after an \$18,000 private salvaging firm had been refused.
