### SEED POTATOES FOR TABLE USE

Another Way to Save Waste in Preparation for the Family Meal.

A very interesting hint is now given by Prof. Perry G. Holden, agricultural expert, who says that seed potatoes may be eaten and planted at the same time, thus saving much waste. "It is a thing that should be done," he says, "in this time of high-priced potatoes. Every one should know that there is a 'seed end' of a potato. It takes no skill to find it, for that is the end from which most of the sprouts come. Cut that end off, plant it, and cook the rest. But it can be carried even further than this. All of the 'eyes' of a potato can be cut out, with enough of the meat of the potato to give it growth, and the remainder eaten. Save the seed ends, save the eyes of all potatoes eaten during the planting season and the nation will have a mighty supply of 'seed' that otherwise would be wasted."

### TOASTED CIGARETTE APPEARS IN BUTTE

"Lucky Strike" Newest Thing in Smokes—Result of Years of Experimenting.

As the result of experiments conducted for a number of years, the first cigarette containing toasted tobacco was put on the market in Butte yesterday. Because the manufacturers believed they have been lucky in striking a formula that gives perfect satisfaction, the new cigarette will be known as "Lucky Strike."  
 The new cigarette is made of Burley and Turkish tobacco. The Burley comes from Kentucky and is subjected to a special treatment.  
 During the past two weeks samples have been distributed about the city. Smokers who have tried out the new article have been bothering local merchants for days, asking for the new cigarette. Shipments were delayed, however, and despite pleas from the merchants, the travelling agents for the cigarette company have been unable to make deliveries. Yesterday 3,000,000 of the new cigarettes arrived and were distributed. The packages contain 20 cigarettes and retail for 10 cents in other places. Owing to high expenses in Butte the price will probably be 12½ cents here.
