The arrangement is a system of iron drawers set into the frame of the counter in the front of which are glass covered compartments for exhibiting the contents while subjecting only a small quantity to loss by drying or discoloration. Mr. Smur also some time ago designed an ice chest for keeping butter, eggs, and perishable bottled goods which is an ornament to the store and the completest thing ever made for the purpose.

**STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.**

**The Mystic Fluid Enters Deer Lodge and Two Lives are Nearly Taken.**

On Sunday afternoon this vicinity was visited by one of the severest thunder storms, accompanied by a flood of rain, that has been known here in many years. The lightning was remarkably vivid and frequent and the whole atmosphere remained distinctly charged with electricity for some time after the storm. At about 12:30 a particularly lurid flash occurred, which was perceptibly felt by every one, while the report was so near and sharp that it was realized the bolt had struck some part of the city.

A few moments later the report was circulated that the point where the subtle fluid had chosen as a target was the store of William Coffman, and a representative of THE NEW NORTHWEST on visiting the place was shown the tracks left by the mysterious invader.

The shaft first struck the flag staff on the roof, following it down to the tin covering which it penetrated, and then passing on down through the attic and upper room it entered the store room below and sped along the metal rain grooves surrounding the window casing until it came in contact with a wire attached to an incandescent electric lamp. This piece of steel wire was more than half consumed by the current and may possibly have served to exhaust its force, as it seems to have gone no further.

The most marvelous incident connected with the event was the narrow escape of Miss Alice Coleman, daughter of the proprietor, and Josef Mulchay, his clerk, who chanced to be sitting at the moment on the window ledge. At the instant of the report Miss Coleman fell back momentarily insensible, but soon recovered. Mr. Mulchay was profoundly shocked but in the excitement it was not at first known that he had sustained any injury, but later it was discovered that his neck was somewhat burned, though in no other way did he bear marks of the contact. Neither have since felt any effects of their unpleasant experience, but both may be indeed profoundly thankful for their surprising escape from death or very serious injury.
