In both church and temperance work Mrs. Hanna C. Farnham was indefatigable, and in her daily work and conversation a pattern of everything that was good and praiseworthy, and had she lived during Paul's day, and been associated with that great Gospel Missionary, he would have written of her, after having become a "Shut in" as he did of a similar Christian woman, "Salute the beloved Priscilla who labored much in the Lord."

Mrs. Hanna C. Farnham, the subject of this brief biographical sketch "labored much in the Lord," and never did the Lord have a more willing laborer, always ready, and gladly willing to contribute her spare time to the good of the community where for the time her lot was cast, and for the betterment of the world.

She was born in Canaan, New Hampshire in the year 1829, A. D. and the following from her own Diary tells us something of her early Christian life. She says: "I was eight years old when a Sunday school was opened in our school house. We had no books but our Testaments. Our first lesson was eighteen verses in the first chapter of the Gospel of John, which we committed to memory. These verses were always precious to me. We had meetings in the school house and in our homes. There were many conversions. I among others. When twelve and a half years old, I was baptized." On another page she writes, "I am willing to be all that God asks me to be. His promises are sure. And toward the close of her long helplessness, extended over some twelve years, patiently endured and sweetly sustained by God's all sufficient grace, she wrote, "I am ready to go," and on the 23rd of January 1905, from the home of her niece Mrs. Lizzie Sargent, in Walworth Nebraska, where she had been tenderly cared for, the Lord took her from suffering to "the land of pure delight where saints immortal reign."

Of Sister Farnham I cheerfully write as did Paul of Sister Phoebe, in Romans 16: 1. She hath been a succourer of many and of myself also. Her niece, Mrs. Sargent, writing to me of her Aunt's death testifies to her many christian virtues, the good that she was ever striving to do, and especially of her patience and meekness during her years of suffering helplessness. The following beautiful and very pathetic poem entitled "Shut In," was copied from a Sunday school paper by Mrs. G. E. Stickney of Elk Grove, California another niece of the deceased and sent to me in memory of her Aunt, with the request that I offer it for publication in connection with this article, and its publication will be appreciated by her and all of Sister Farnham's friends and they are many.
