## IOWA LEGISLATURE IS DRY

Anti-Saloon Forces Say Both House and Senate So Made Up. WILL NOT CHANGE MULLET LAW

Polliceman in Des Moines Finds Striking Teamster in Possession of Gun and Deputy's Sheriff's Commission. (From a Staff Correspondent.)

DES MOINES, Nov. 21.—(Special Telegram.)—A statement given out today by the anti-saloon league of the state makes the claim that the next legislature of Iowa is "dry" and will not be disposed to take any action in the matter of changing the mullet law of Iowa. A careful canvass has been made and it is reported that the senate stands twenty-six to twenty-four for prohibition and the house sixty to forty-eight the same way.

A great many questions affecting saloons will come before the legislature.

**Voting Machine Case Up.**  
In the district court today the attorneys presented the case of voting machines in use in Iowa at the election and made a strong case against them. It was claimed that in this country at least 2,000 voters failed to vote in the state because of confusion over the levers and supposed that in fact they had voted for the candidates for those offices. The court took the matter under advisement.

**Insurance Endorsement.**  
The State Association of Mutual Insurance Companies, today endorsed an anti-discrimination measure on the fire marshal law and elected the following officers: President, Frank Paul, Mason City; vice president, R. A. Conners, Cresco; secretary, F. Van Druff, Council Bluffs; delegate to the national convention, former President F. J. Shaw, Rolfe.

**Driver Deputy Sheriff.**  
Police found a new obstacle in their pathway in the local strike when an officer went to disarm a transfer wagon driver and found him with a gun and a deputy sheriff's commission.

## LOUD HOBIERY UNDER BAN AT MARSHALLTOWN

MARSHALLTOWN, Ia., Nov. 21.—(Special.)—Because a bevy of high school misses went to school today wearing stockings of the "loud" patterns obtainable, thirty of them were politely excused from the school room and sent home to change their varied loud hosiery for more sedate shades. Shades of green, embellished with old rose; gaudy reds with and without black polka dots; broad stripes that ran around, and could be seen for a block on a windy day, and no less clamorous stripes that ran the other way all entered into the display. Teachers allege that the "rubbing" of the high school youths threatened to disorganize the school all day and that more pencils and books were dropped during the short time the girls were allowed to remain in the school room than have been dropped in months. Because they were sent home each of the girls who fell under the ban were debited with a tardy mark. Three such marks makes the taking of all examinations compulsory.

attorney for the Union Pacific Railroad company and attended to "a Nebraska situation." In 1871 he was selected without opposition from Douglas county to the constitutional convention which adopted a constitution, but which was afterwards rejected upon a vote of the people. In 1879 he was the democratic nominee for supreme judge against Judge Amasa Cobb, who was successful in the race.

**Appointed by Dawes.**  
In 1883 Judge Wakeley was appointed by Governor Dawes upon solicitation of the bar judge of the Third judicial district, an associate with Judge Neville. In the fall both were elected without opposition. In 1887 Judge Wakeley was re-elected on an independent ticket, but in 1891 he was defeated.

Judge Wakeley then resumed his practice and was the state's representative in the case against Treasurer Hill and against State Oil Inspector Hinton, taking the initiative in establishing the right of the supreme court to exercise its original jurisdiction conferred by the constitution without a statute regulating or providing therefor.

In May 1894 Judge Wakeley was married to Miss Constock at Whitewater, Wis., a lineal descendant of Lewis Morris, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and a niece of J. Fenimore Cooper. Two sons and two daughters of the family are living. Arthur C. Wakeley, a practicing lawyer; Lucius W. Wakeley, gen-

Judge Wakeley was at all times a democrat, but in 1886 and in 1890 he did not support the nominee of the party because of the free silver platform.

Judge Wakeley was above all a domestic man and his greatest delight was in his family, being devoted to his wife more than the average citizen.

There was nothing spectacular about Judge Wakeley and nothing on the grandstand order. His knowledge of law was most comprehensive and he was noted among his friends and the community as a man of moderation; on the bench he was known to observe the logic of things. He was elected to the district bench and being a democrat was frequently used by the democrats to overcome an enormous republican majority. He was a pillar of strength in a strong community.

**Many Quarrels Preceded Killing of Brokke**

FOREST CITY, Ia., Nov. 21.—Quarrels and personal encounters between Oscar Bowers and Carl Brokke, which led to the shooting in which Brokke was killed last June, were detailed by state witnesses in the case of Bowers, now on trial in the district court here. The defense began the presentation of its case today, the state having rested last night.

Mrs. Brokke, widow of the dead man, told the jury how her husband, after a quarrel with Bowers, whose chickens had been trespassing in their yard, returned to his house for a gun to shoot the chickens, and of the appearance of Bowers with his gun. She claimed Bowers was the aggressor.
