Some One Put One Over on the Mayor, Says Mr. Dahlman

Mayor James C. Dahlman has uncovered the fact that a city councilman "put something over on him," and at a meeting of the city commission yesterday morning the mayor "came back." He introduced an amendment to the ordinance which makes it a misdemeanor for an officer to discriminate between patrons, on which score there has been many complaints this summer.

"In 1907 I had the present ordinance passed," said the mayor, "and in that ordinance I was careful to provide against discrimination, but it seems an amendment was later passed cutting out the discriminatory clause. Who did it? That's a mystery. I got the credit for doing it, but I knew absolutely nothing about it."

Recently attorneys for ice dealers who were charged with discriminating against patrons and even refusing to sell to some customers produced the ordinance in police court to prove it was not against the law to discriminate. The mayor immediately investigated and found his ordinance as originally passed had been "butchered" by an amendment. The ordinance he now introduces if passed will bring the original ordinance into force again, as he simply amends the amended ordinance by inserting the original clause against discrimination.

Detectives Arrest Men Believed to Be Postoffice Robbers

John Clark and Alrich Smeer, charged with the Dundee and other postoffice robberies that have recently been committed in this locality, were arrested yesterday by Detectives Sullivan and Leahy. Clark gives his address as the Keystone hotel, Fourteenth and Douglas streets, and Smeer says his residence is at Shelby, Ind. The clue leading up to their arrest was furnished by the authorities by a pawnbroker to whom some of the swag had been taken for a loan. Twenty-five of the 5-cent stamps taken from an Omaha branch postoffice, No. 16, were found on the men besides a number of other articles that have been missing from the other offices visited.

MUST LIVE RIGHT TO BE WELL

Dr. L. A. Merriam Addresses Missouri Valley Medical Society.

SESSIONS ARE AT THE ROME
Fifty in Attendance at the Opening Session and Many More Expected During Day—Prominent Men Coming.

"The practice of medicine and surgery has been greatly commercialized, and both have been practiced for the benefit of the bank account," said Dr. L. A. Merriam of Omaha in an address to the Medical Society of the Missouri Valley in its opening meeting at the Hotel Rome. "Physicians and surgeons don't know their physiology because the subject is not properly taught in their schools. They know nothing of psychology because that subject is not taught at all in the medical schools. Not one in a thousand knows how to advise right thinking and right living. They give too much attention to the subject of germs and not enough attention to the condition of the blood, the soil in which the germs thrive."

"Christian Science, a corporation for business under the name of religion, may have its value, but it is also full of errors and ignorance."

Must Obey Laws of Nature.
These remarks followed his development of the evolution of the medical science, in which he said that just as the baneful idea of forgiveness of sin had gained its hold on people for thousands of years, so the idea had grown up that a man could violate the laws of nature in regard to his physical being and then restore himself by taking a little extract of roots and other preparations.

"Eighty per cent of the surgical operations are needlessly performed," he said, "for the extirpation of money. Four-fifths of the medicines given are worse than useless, because they are even injurious to the system. The floating kidney, appendicitis and other facts have been exploited by surgeons to get money. But these facts will have their day and the good that has been discovered will be absorbed in the new science."

"To be well one must know what to do and cannot violate the laws of health without suffering." He urged right thinking and "right living" as the means of preventing disease.
