**RED CROSS AT BRANDEIS**

Local Store Establishes Booth for Donations for War Sufferers.

**MANY LIVES ARE IN DANGER**

With Colder Weather Coming Over Devastated Countries Warm Clothing is Needed by the Homeless Natives.

Co-operating with the American National Red Cross association in an effort to relieve the destitution and suffering in the war zone of Europe, the J. L. Brandeis Son's company has secured the location of a Red Cross booth in the Brandeis store. It is in charge of Mrs. Dahl and she will remain there so long as contributions continue to come in the shape of cash and new merchandise of all kinds. Collections will be forwarded free of charge to the national headquarters in Washington.

The Red Cross booth in the Brandeis store is in a convenient location. It occupies a prominent position on the third floor, Douglas street side of the big building, and directly in front of the elevator. To reach it by telephone is only necessary to call the Brandeis store and ask to be connected with the Red Cross department.

In the Brandeis store the Red Cross booth was established only Monday morning. Its success has been remarkable, and many contributions have been taken in by Mrs. Dahl, but there is a necessity for much more, as the amount of suffering that the national association must relieve is enormous beyond contemplation. Then, too, there is a great demand for clothing, particularly articles for women and children.

**Association Sends Out Appeal.**

The national association has sent out an appeal stating that unless the United States responds liberally and quickly, as soon as the cold weather sets in, thousands of women and children in the war zone of Europe will die daily of cold and starvation.

The Brandeis Store people assert that even small contributions of cash or merchandise at this time may result in saving the lives of numerous people who have been left destitute, homeless and friendless by reason of the war that has swept over such a large portion of Europe, leaving only a waste of country and helpless women and children behind.

In order to have supplies reach Europe in time to save the lives of the women and innocent children, there must be great haste in forwarding the articles that are to be contributed. Each day of delay aggravates the situation.

The proposition of opening a branch of the American National Red Cross association was taken up by the Brandeis Store with the national officers. It met with their hearty approval and, as a result, it has been established and Mrs. Dahl placed in charge to receive all contributions.

The Brandeis people make nothing out of the proposition. Instead, to them it is considerable expense. They give the valuable space in the store, employ Mrs. Dahl and pay for the packing and shipping of all merchandise forwarded and money sent to the national headquarters in Washington.

**MADDEN TO CONTEST VOTE**

Defeated Candidate for Police Judge to Ask Recount of Ballots.

**DR. QUIGLEY IS STILL HOPEFUL**

Applicant for the County Coroner'ship Will Wait for Official Count, However, Before Taking Action.

Contrary to report, R. J. Madden, democratic candidate for police judge, has not conceded the re-election of Judge Charles E. Foster. Madden declares he will not concede Foster's election unless the latter gains considerably on the official canvass of the election. According to the unofficial returns, Foster is ahead of Madden by only about eighty votes.

Madden held a conference with the election commissioner, before announcing that he did not concede the election, and would carry the matter to a recount, if necessary.

The official canvass of the election will be started Saturday morning in the election commissioner's office. Plans are almost completed for it, and the work will be pushed through as fast as consistent with accuracy, in order to settle uncertainties in the election, due to the very close vote on police judge, coroner and representatives.

Dr. Willard H. Quigley, whose defeat by Coroner Willis Crosby is indicated on the face of official returns, is also said to be hoping for a changed result on the official count. He is about 123 votes behind Crosby, according to unofficial figures.

**Richmond is After the Speakership Job**

After having the experience of feeling himself badly defeated, and again having the experience of having himself handsomely elected, Henry C. Richmond, representative-elect from Douglas county, is now out trying to talk himself into the speaker's chair. Mr. Richmond has long been associated with the legislature in one capacity and another. He was clerk of the house in the last session. Ever since he announced himself as a candidate for the legislature it has been known that he courted the hope of landing the speakership if he should be elected.

**Railroads Out of Omaha to Get Pay Advance on Mail**

The readjustment following the weighing of the mails by the railway mail department last spring, which went into effect July 1 of this year, shows some very interesting results in the list of figures sent to the local department from headquarters.

Every four years this weighing occurs and a very material increase in the mail pay of the transcontinental railroads is apparent when comparing the new period to the one just closed. The Union Pacific's mail pay has increased to the extent of \$90,000 a year on that part of the road from Omaha to Ogden, while the Northwestern is credited with an increase of 50 per cent, and the Santa Fe from Kansas City to Los Angeles 40 per cent.

Changes in train schedules of rival roads are partially responsible for the increase on the Union Pacific, particularly on Pacific coast matter, a great quantity of which is being carried by the Oregon Short Line between Granger and Pocatello. This deduction is made by the department from the fact that no more than usual increase of from 5 to 7 per cent in the country's mail is apparent. The mails carried west are entirely out of proportion to the amounts being transported in other parts of the country, which the department declares to be indicative of a rapid settlement of the Pacific coast country.

The heaviest increase in mail pay is apparent on some of the Colorado lines, one in particular having advanced 130 per cent.

This is owing to the fact that the parcel post carries shipments of fruit and general merchandise at a cheaper figure than the express companies. A normal, healthy growth is apparent in local transportation, and conditions here were never better from the standpoint of the department and the railroads.

In the afternoon the Mobile & Ohio railroad, in conjunction with other roads, brought a rate case before the examiner to finally determine the rate question in relation to black strap molasses.

Saturday morning probably the most important rate case of the year will receive a hearing. The case in question is to determine the rate on lumber, and practically all the railroads of the continent are interested in the result. After a two days' hearing in Chicago the case was adjourned to be taken up in Omaha.
