## BANGS GIVES BIG SUM TO CATHEDRAL

Omaha Pioneer Leaves Fifty Thousand to Church and Remembers Well Other Institutions.

### CLARKSON HOSPITAL ON LIST

Gardner Memorial Parish House and Associated Charities Also Beneficiaries, as Well as Some Relatives.

A bequest of \$50,000 to Trinity cathedral of Omaha is made by the will of the late Stephen D. Bangs, Omaha pioneer, filed for probate in county court. To Clarkson hospital is given \$5,000; to Gardner Memorial Parish House association \$2,000, and to the Associated Charities \$2,500.

The will is dated December 16. Mr. Bangs died the following day. His estate is estimated to be worth \$200,000. Mr. Bangs assisted in the foundation of Trinity cathedral. He was much interested in the charitable work of his stepson, the late Richard S. Hall, and the following bequests are made to the Hall family and other heirs:

Florence Ware Hall, \$50,000; Richard Ware Hall, \$25,000; Dorothy Hall, \$15,000; Janet Elliot Hall, \$15,000; Jasper Landon Hall, \$10,000; Arthur Wolcott and wife, \$10,000.

The will names W. M. Rainbolt executor, with full power to dispose of the extensive real estate holdings of the estate. Mr. Bangs was born in England October 11, 1831, and came to America when 17 years old. He came to Nebraska in 1854 and was a witness of many scenes of early life in this state, among which was the funeral of Logan Fontenelle, chief of the Omaha Indians, who was killed in battle with the Sioux.

### GROVER'S AMBITION IS NOT TO BE REALIZED

For several years it has been Logan Grover's ambition to be one of Uncle Sam's soldiers. His father, A. J. Grover, of 38 Mount Vernon avenue, Council Bluffs, used to be a contractor in the Philippines.

But for over three years young Grover has failed in repeated efforts to enlist. Now he is permanently disqualified from service by a recent misfortune.

First he applied for enlistment at Jefferson Barracks, Mo., but was told that the need of a surgical operation made him unacceptable as a recruit. He had the operation performed and applied again the next year, only to find that he was then not heavy enough.

So he started in to gain flesh, taking an outdoor job. But he accidentally got his feet frozen, and the examining surgeon told him his feet were permanently crippled by the mishap.
