House Passes Bill that Will Prohibit Employment of Whole Families.

VOTE UPON THE MEASURE

LINCOLN, March 3.—(Special.)—The house took a fall out of nepotism this morning, but the tussle was close, and father, mother, daughter and son sat shivering for many minutes before they became convinced that public officers were not created for the whole family.

The bill makes it unlawful for any public official to appoint or employ a relative in his office.

Public Utilities Bill Killed by the House

The restaurant was planned to serve a nourishing meal to the needy for 1 cent. Four husky men among the first customers, "Louis," "George," "English" and an unidentified one, were chosen by the women as managers.
