Head Off This Craft

The lawmakers at Lincoln should be made to understand that there is no excuse for reviving the jail feeding graft by the proposed bill giving the sheriff 40 cents a day for feeding each prisoner in his custody.

For five years the furnishing of food to the prisoners was let by contract at a cost to the taxpayers of 19 cents a day on a two-meal basis, equivalent to not to exceed 27 cents a day on a three-meal basis.

The present sheriff himself put in a bid, in the name of a sister-in-law to feed the prisoners for 19 cents a day, on which he had figured himself a profit, yet now wants to run the cost up on the taxpayers to 40 cents a day.
