LIEFIELD'S PITCHING WAS A FEATURE

McChesney Knocks Out a Home Run with Two Men on Bases—Omaha Starts Well, but Quits Too Soon.

DES MOINES, Ia., Sept. 1.—(Special Telegram.)—In a spirited game, which marks the close of the Omaha-Des Moines games for the season, the politicians defeated the House team by a score of 3 to 2 and, incidentally, made it three straight. Dumb play was frequent on the part of the Omahans. The error column falls short in its depiction of plays that were enacted by Omaha men at different stages of the game.

Pop play was not solely accountable, however, for the politician hit at a winning pace. McChesney's home run in the third inning, which drove two runs ahead of him, was the feature, along with Liefield's pitching, which was strong at all times. 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MANY RECORDS ARE BROKEN

First Half of Olympic Program Covers the Participants with Glory. AMERICAN ATHLETES WIN FOUR EVENTS. M. J. Sheridan of New York Leads the World's Record for Discus Throw Over Four Feet.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 1.—American athletes held the center of the stage today—the fourth of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition revival of the Olympic games and to their pluck and grit belongs the credit for creating one world's record and three Olympic records. One of the greatest races of the 1904 Olympiad was the 300 meter run. The distance in American measure is 874.8 yards. Entered in the race were representatives of the United States, Germany, Canada and New Zealand, but the first four places were claimed by men running under the colors of Chicago, New York and Milwaukee Athletic clubs. James D. Lightbody of the Chicago Athletic association lowered the Olympic record by five and two-thirds seconds.

The world's record for the discus throw was broken by W. J. Sheridan of New York, who made a mark of 122 feet. The previous record, which was held by Sheridan, was 127 feet 9 inches.

H. L. Hillman of the New York Athletic club maintained his reputation as the fastest man in the world over hurdles by breaking the Olympic record of 25 seconds, made by A. C. Krause, University of Pennsylvania, at Paris in 1900. Hillman made the distance in 24 1/2 seconds.

M. Prinstein of the Greater New York Athletic association broke the Olympic record in the running broad jump on his fourth trial, with a distance of 24 feet 1 inch. The record was formerly held by A. C. Krause, University of Pennsylvania, who jumped 23 feet 6 1/2 inches at the Paris Olympiad in 1900.

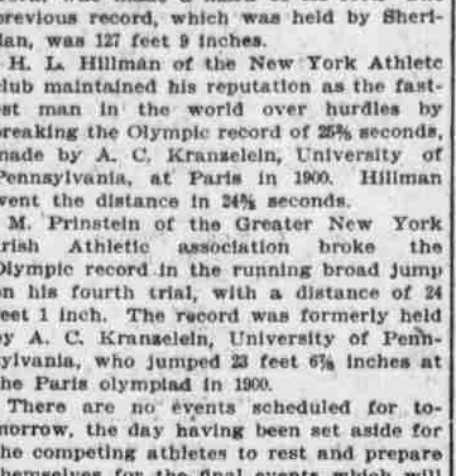
