

PLAN MOVE AGAINST PEERS

Liberals Will Meet to Arrange Order of Sweeping Campaign.

TIME FOR CHANGE IS HERE

Lord Pentland Declares Constitution and Character of the House of Lords Must Be Modified.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—At a prolonged meeting of the cabinet today, held to discuss the crisis arising from Lord Lansdowne's motion to withhold from the budget bill the consent of the House of Lords, it was decided to call an immediate meeting of the liberal party for the purpose of outlining a plan of campaign.

In Parliamentary circles, it is believed the House of Commons will be prorogued early as next Tuesday, following Premier Asquith's announcement of the government's decision.

Interest in Budget Debate. Interest in the budget debate in the House of Lords yesterday was well sustained. The House and galleries were again crowded and many peruses were present.

Under Attorney General Thompson's opinion the board probably will issue a call for bids within a few days.

IOWA FEDERATION IN THE CLEAR

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 24.—(Special Telegram.)—If the plans of a number of local reformers succeed there will be established in the Des Moines schools within the next year a department of instruction in social hygiene, with a prominent physician to direct the instruction of the boys and a woman physician for the girls.

Iowa in Good Standing. President Urick of the Iowa Federation of Labor, who has just returned from the Toronto meeting of the American federation, says that the Iowa federation will be restored to full fellowship and standing whenever application is made.

REMOVAL OF A BIG FACTORY

CHIEF JUSTICE REVERSED

NO INTEREST IN BROWN CASE
