Dies Charges Radio Men 'Intimidated'

HITLER WANTS ALL OF LAND LOST IN WAR

RE FORCED TO PERMIT SPEECH HE DECLARES

Press Writer to Follow Him After He Carries Quiz Facts to People

FOLLOWS CHARGE OF SABOTAGE EFFORTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (UP)—Charles Dies, publicity director of the Democratic national committee, today said he had been responsible for making arrangements for a newspaperman to broadcast a reply to the radio speech tonight by Chairman Dies of the house committee investigating un-American activities.

Dies, charging the administration with attempts to sabotage the work of his committee, arranged for the broadcast over a Washington station "to reveal the whole story," concerning antagonism toward the committee.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31. (UP)—Chairman Dies, D. Texas, of the house committee investigating un-American activities charged last night that administration officials had "intimidated" a nationwide radio broadcasting chain in connection with purported New York attempts to sabotage Dies's inquiry.

Dies said he had received authentic information that William Dolph, manager of local station WOL, an affiliate of the Mutual network, had been "forced" to give radio time to Paul Y. Anderson, St. Louis newspaperman, to reply to Dies's own speech over the same network tonight.

Dies earlier yesterday had said in his address would contain definite proof "that top-flight radio dealers, including cabinet officials, sought to obstruct the committee's work for political reasons."

The latest development in the dispute between Dies and Roosevelt administration came last night when Dies announced that he would be followed on the air by Anderson, who also would discuss the committee's work.

BLAZES, AUTO CRASHES KILL 14 ON SUNDAY

6 People Die on Mississippi Highway; 4 Negro Prisoners Incinerated

(By United Press) Automobile accidents and fires killed at least 14 persons and injured a score or more over the nation Sunday.

Six persons died when a small open automobile crashed into a heavily-loaded bus nine miles south of Jackson, Miss. All five occupants of the auto and the driver of the bus, Paul Gaines, 42, of New Orleans, were killed. Three of the bus' passengers were injured.

At Glensville, Ga., four negro prisoners in the city jail were burned to death when fire destroyed the small one-story structure. Authorities believed the building caught from a coal-burn stove used to heat the jail.

RADIO DRAMA CAUSING PANIC INVESTIGATED

Many Not Hearing Explanation of 'War of Worlds' in Consternation

HEART ATTACKS AND ONE STROKE RESULT

NEW YORK, Oct. 31. (UP)—The Federal Communications commission today investigated the radio program which caused thousands in every part of the United States to believe that the eastern part of the nation had been invaded by creatures from the planet Mars in the first engagement of "The War of the Worlds."

Hysteria following the Mercury theatre radio dramatic program last night swamped police and newspapers of New York City and New Jersey towns, where Martian invaders were said to have landed, killing thousands after leaving a "space rocket."

Hysteria spread to the Pacific coast where thousands of telephone calls asked about the "invasion." The play was a dramatization of H. G. Wells' novel, "The War of the Worlds."

Residents of New Jersey fled their homes, squad cars and ambulances roared throughout the country were besieged with telephone calls demanding to know about a "meteor which fell in New Jersey."

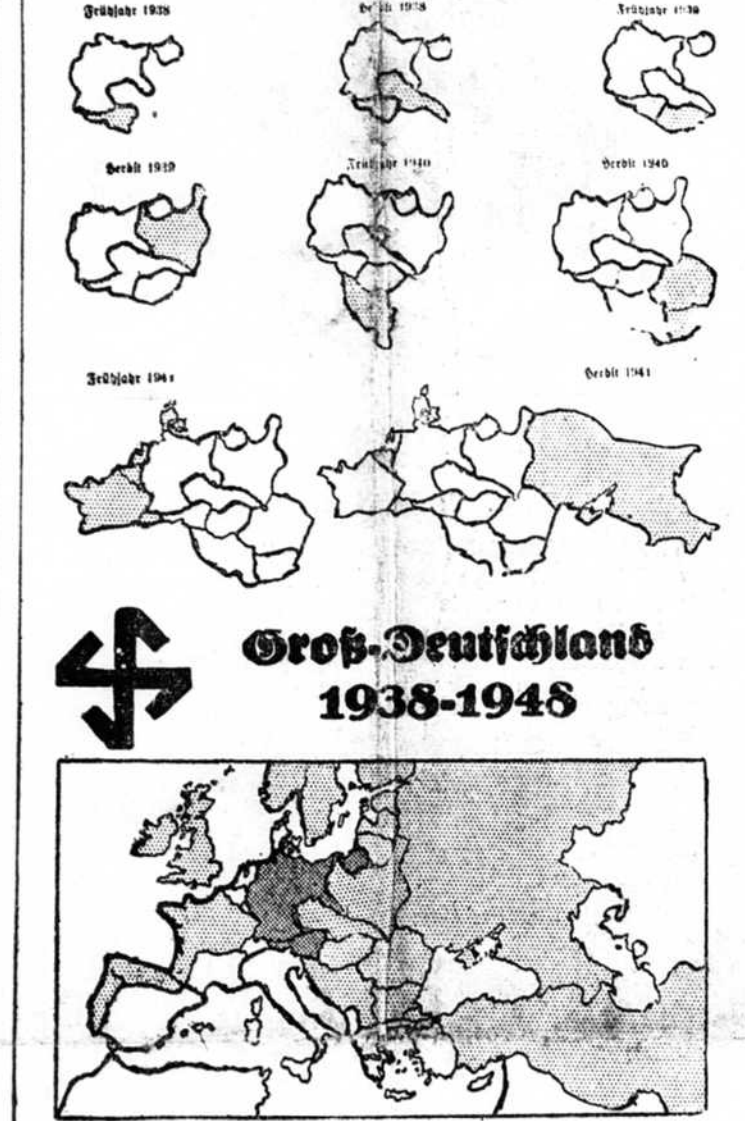
In the radio rendition the report of a meteor falling near Trenton, N. J., was made so realistically that persons who tuned in after the introductory remarks had been made believed the statement to be fact.

There was an immediate flood of telephone calls to newspaper offices, police stations and hospitals. A report spread through Newark that the city was to be the target of a "gas bomb attack."

Other cities from coast to coast. Tulsa, Okla., reported two heart attacks and a stroke resulting from the dramatization. Los Angeles, Dallas, Kansas City, and Omaha reported hundreds of telephone calls to authorities and newspaper offices, some from persons who had relatives in New Jersey and feared for their safety.

SOUTH WILL RENEW FIGHT FOR LAW TO HALT FREIGHT TARIFF DISCRIMINATIONS

Three North Carolina Congressmen Pledge Backing When Congress Meets

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 31.—(UP)—Southern and southwestern senators and representatives of the United States congress last night promised to band together to fight for enactment of legislation which would end freight rate discriminations against the South.

From Texas to Virginia and from Arkansas to Florida, legislators responded in the same manner to an editorial carried by the Commercial Appeal on October 12 calling for renomination and support of the Ramspeck bill which died in committee last January. Copies of the editorial and requests for opinions were mailed to all southern statesmen.

In part, the editorial said: "The practical effect of the bill was to eliminate the discrimination in charges that has so long penalized the South. The bill was referred to the committee on interstate and foreign commerce, it died there. But a new congress meets in January. A new shuffle is coming up. More sinews of war have been provided. More facts have been developed."

A direct way of attacking this injustice, the editorial continued, is to place the matter before congress as Rep. Robert Ramspeck, D., Ga., author of the bill has done.

JONAS SPEAKS TUESDAY EVE

GOP U. S. Senatorial Candidate, and Gudger Both To Be Here

Honorable Charles A. Jonas of Lincoln, Republican nominee for the United States senate, will address a Republican rally on Tuesday night at 7:30 o'clock at the county courthouse.

Mr. Jonas, a former member of the general assembly and state senate, and former U. S. congressman, is widely known as a speaker.

British Quarters Say Chamberlain Unwilling for Full Restitution POWERS REALIZING SETTLEMENT NEEDED

(UP)—Great Britain today anticipated an early memorandum from Chancellor Adolf Hitler on his colonial demands as result of a speech Saturday by the German colonial affairs deputy outlining the broad sweep of the Reich's "restitution" program.

A demand by colonial chief Gen. Franz Ritter von Epp, speaking at Ladeburg, Germany, for return without exception of all of the Reich's war-lost overseas possessions, was believed to mark a new phase in Hitler's colonial program, for which Great Britain is preparing.

von Epp's speech, asserting that Germany was stripped of her colonies by the Versailles Treaty "under false pretenses," caused speculation that Hitler might be ready to submit not only his formal demands but some suggested method of settlement.

The visit to Rome of German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop, who conferred with Premier Benito Mussolini and Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano, was believed to have brought about an agreement regarding the line of action which will be followed by the Rome-Berlin axis on the question.

Italy has no colonial claims herself but Mussolini has publicly supported Germany's demand for "a place in the African sun."

British observers said that von Epp's demands against "all of Germany's colonies" meant that Hitler wants all of the pre-war German colonies totalling an area six times larger than the Reich—would not influence the present attitude of the mandatory powers.

These powers, it was explained, recognize the need for a colonial settlement but refuse to make complete restitution. Even the determination of British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain to give to Germany a portion of Angola, Britain and France, in return, might reimburse Belgium and Portugal with other African territory. Germany has unofficially rejected this scheme, however, saying that she wants only what "legally belongs to us."

Judge J. J. Gentry And Wife Injured In Car Collision

Elderly Spartanburg Lawyer's Car Crashes on New Spartanburg Rd.

SPARTANBURG, S. C., Oct. 31.—Judge J. J. Gentry, prominent Spartanburg county attorney, and his wife were injured in an automobile collision on the new Asheville highway, a few feet from the city limits, about 6:30 o'clock last night.

Both Judge Gentry and his wife were admitted to the Spartanburg General hospital, where their condition was reported "only fair" late last night.

Judge Gentry, whose age was listed as 73, was reported suffering from shock, numerous bruises and minor lacerations. Mrs. Gentry suffered a broken nose, dislocated hip, and other injuries in the collision.

None of the occupants of the other car involved in the accident was reported injured.

Judge Gentry is one of the county's best known attorneys. He has served as magistrate and also has been interested for many years in evangelistic work.

He makes his home on his peach farm at Bird Mountain, near Landrum.

State highway patrolmen investigated the accident, which occurred in the Cleveland Park vicinity, only a few steps from the corporate limits of the city.

Mussolini and Hitler are only in partial accord on the problem. Hitler has been represented as strongly opposed to such a common frontier by means of the amputation of Ruthenia because it might jeopardize his "drang nach osten" (drive to the east).

The Hungarians and Poles, with Mussolini's support, have argued that it would throw up a barrier against any Soviet Russian penetration to the west.

Germany and Italy, replying to direct appeals from both Czechs and Hungarians, informed the Budapest and Prague governments today that they are willing to act as arbitrators in the minority and border dispute but Mussolini's reported support of the Polish position was said to thus far
