## GERARD WILL NOT AFFIRM PEACE MISSION REPORTS

New York, Oct. 10.—James W. Gerard, American ambassador to Germany, upon his arrival here today, declined to affirm or deny published reports that he was returning to the United States on a peace mission on behalf of the emperor of Germany.

Mr. Gerard's attention was called to a story which appears this morning in the New York World to the effect that his errand was to inform the administration that a renewal of submarine activity is being considered by Germany in a manner which might threaten German-American relations. Mr. Gerard after quickly glancing through this story said: "You don't see me quoted anywhere in it, do you?" Mr. Gerard said that he did not expect to see President Wilson until after the President's return from his trip this week to Indianapolis.

## SOUTHERN PAID OUT \$1.12 FOR EVERY DOLLAR RECEIVED

For every dollar paid to the Southern Railway by the people South during August, 1916, the Southern paid out in the South \$1.12, according to figures announced by Comptroller A. H. Plant.

The Southern Railway disbursed during the month, for labor, material, supplies and other purposes, \$6,088,749, of which \$5,185,350 or 85.16 per cent. was paid to individuals and industries located in the South, this sum being \$637,653 in excess of the total moneys contributed by the South for transportation purposes.

For improvements to its roadway and structures, the Southern spent \$1,178,006.97 in August, as against \$578,340.92 during August, 1915, and \$537,445.24 during August, 1914; during the two months ended August 31st \$2,163,249.34, as against \$1,048,842.89 in 1915 and \$829,137.86 in 1914.

## FOURTH CLASS POSTMASTER EXAMINATION TO BE HELD

On Saturday, November 11, 1916, at 1 P. M. the United States Civil Service Commission announces that an examination will be held at Hendersonville, N. C., as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster at Flat Rock and other vacancies as they may order at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$305 for the last fiscal year.

Age limit, 21 years and over on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at 18 years women 18 years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at Flat Rock or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the commission at Washington at least 7 days before the date of the examination, otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.

## SOUTHERN LOST \$1,250,000 IN THE JULY FLOOD

Richmond, Va., Oct. 10.—John Kerr Branch, of Richmond, Adrian Iselein, Jr., Charles Lanier and Edmund D. Randolph of New York were re-elected as directors of the Southern Railway Company for a term of three years at the annual meeting of the stock-holders held here today.

Special discussion was given the matter of the payment of dividends on the preferred stock, at the close of which resolutions approving the policy of withholding dividends for the present were passed.

In the annual report it was stated that the damage to the property of the company occasioned by the storms of July was estimated at approximately \$1,250,000, without taking into account the loss of tariff or the cost of detouring trains.
