**BOLSHEVIKI PLAN TO  
BUST OUR GOVERNMENT**  
Movement Finance. Generously From Russia, and Includes Schools of Anarchy—German Agents Also Busy Here—Holland Getting Worried

Washington, Jan. 23.—Testifying before the senate committee investigating German propaganda, Archibald Stevenson, of the military intelligence bureau, said today representatives of the bolshevik movement already have organized soviets in the industrial centers of this country, and that their plans contemplate eventual seizure of the government.

Mr. Stevenson also said evidence exists that Germans in the United States have begun a post-war propaganda with a view to exerting an influence which would make the peace terms imposed on Germany less oner-

ous. He called the committee's attention to a recent editorial in the New York Staats Zeitung which, he said, endeavored to convey the idea that American soldiers overseas had come to regard the Germans in a light other than that of enemies.

### KAISER BILL PUSHES

A BUCK SAVVY.

Said to Get up a Perspiration, But Has to Have Wood Brought up by Servants—Skaters Kept Away From Most High Presence.

Amerongen, Holland, Jan. 23.—Sawing wood continues to be the chief occupation of the former German emperor, who spends several hours each day within the castle grounds working hard while several men servants respectfully hand him logs and then pile the short sticks in heaps for use later in the furnaces of the castle.

The shortage of coal in Holland compels the burning of wood. William Hohenzollern works so well he is able to furnish the entire consumption of the castle fires.

The former emperor scarcely ever speaks to his attendants while working. The two moats which encircle the castle are covered with ice sufficiently thick to bear skaters. The villagers, however, have been given to understand that the accustomed permission to skate in the moats can no longer be accorded while the former emperor is in the castle.

There are various reports in circulation concerning the alleged intention of the former German empress to return to Potsdam. These are based on her expressed desire to end her days at Potsdam which she regards as her home. The former empress it is said, has no intention of leaving her husband in Holland. Communication between the former empress and her children and grand children is fairly frequent by letter and telegram.

For several weeks nothing has been heard from the former crown prince, who remains virtually alone on the Island of Wieringen.

Several more members of the former emperor's suite are about to leave for Germany, where, as state servants, they must place themselves

at the disposal of the government or forfeit their right to pensions. Lieutenant-General von Estorff, whose wife is an American, will continue to devote himself to the former emperor.

### WAR DEPARTMENT PLANS POSTPONED.

No Decision on Universal Service.—Back to Old \$15 a Month for Privates—Poison Gas Condemned.

Washington, Jan. 24.—The house military committee practically reached an agreement today in conference with Secretary Baker and General March, chief of staff, to postpone the war department reorganization bill until the next session of Congress and with it a large part of the prospective debate over the future military policy of the country.

"The question of universal training is a question of national policy," said General March. "It is the duty of the general staff to submit recommendations to the secretary of war when they are called for. If they do not get by the secretary, they are stopped."

General March said the army was now organized under presidential order and the plan included in the staff bill was practically that organization. A total strength of 509,000 men is provided for, he said, to be organized into 20 divisions grouped in five corps. The total annual cost he fixed at \$1,185,000,000, estimated on a return to a base pay of \$15 a month for privates and exclusive of \$86,000,000 carried in the fortifications bill.

All of the existing wartime organizations such as the tank corps, transportation and motor transportation corps, independent air service and the like, are to be continued, with the exception of the chemical warfare service.

"We are not in favor of the use of poison gas in war," General March declared, "not that it makes any difference how you kill a soldier, but the gas lies on the ground and penetrates back to villages and kills women and children. No civilized nation ought to use it."

### HELD WITHOUT BAIL FOR HENNESSEE MURDER.

Aaron Wiseman Committed to Jail After Two Witnesses Identify Him as Man Who Shot With Two Guns.—Held for March Term of Court.

Morganton, Jan., 25.—Two state's witnesses, at a preliminary hearing held here this afternoon, identified Aaron Wiseman as the man they saw kill Dr. E. A. Hennessee, at Glen Alpine, on January 31, 1918.

The star witness for the state, Fred W. Amos, of Rock Hill, S. C., could not be shaken in his testimony, cross-

examination seeming only to make him more positive in his statements that he knew the man who killed Dr. Hennessee to be no other than Aaron Wiseman, whom he had known for many years and whom he could identify positively as the man he had seen from the train window on the night of the killing, shooting with two pistols. He described his dress and general appearance and stated a number of times that there was no question in his mind.

This testimony was substantiated by J. M. Ramsey, a passenger on the

same train, who identified Wiseman as to height, weight and movements as the same man he had seen shooting on the night of the tragedy; told how the murderer was dressed, and that he shot with two pistols, one of blue steel, the other nickel-plated. W. N. Hennessee, of Glen Alpine, a brother of the dead man, testified that Dr. Hennessee's body bore ten distinct bullet wounds, all entering from the back. Judge Long committed Wiseman to jail without bail awaiting the next term of Burke criminal court, which will convene March 10.
