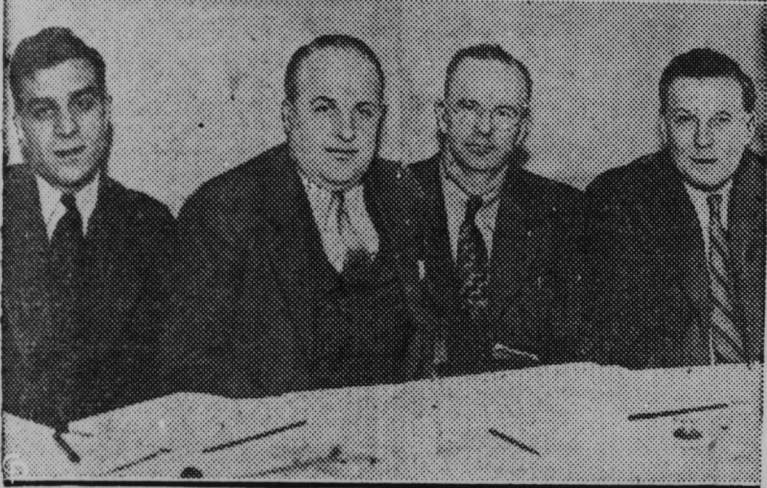

Two Duplin County Negroes To Die For Rape On White Woman In Duplin County

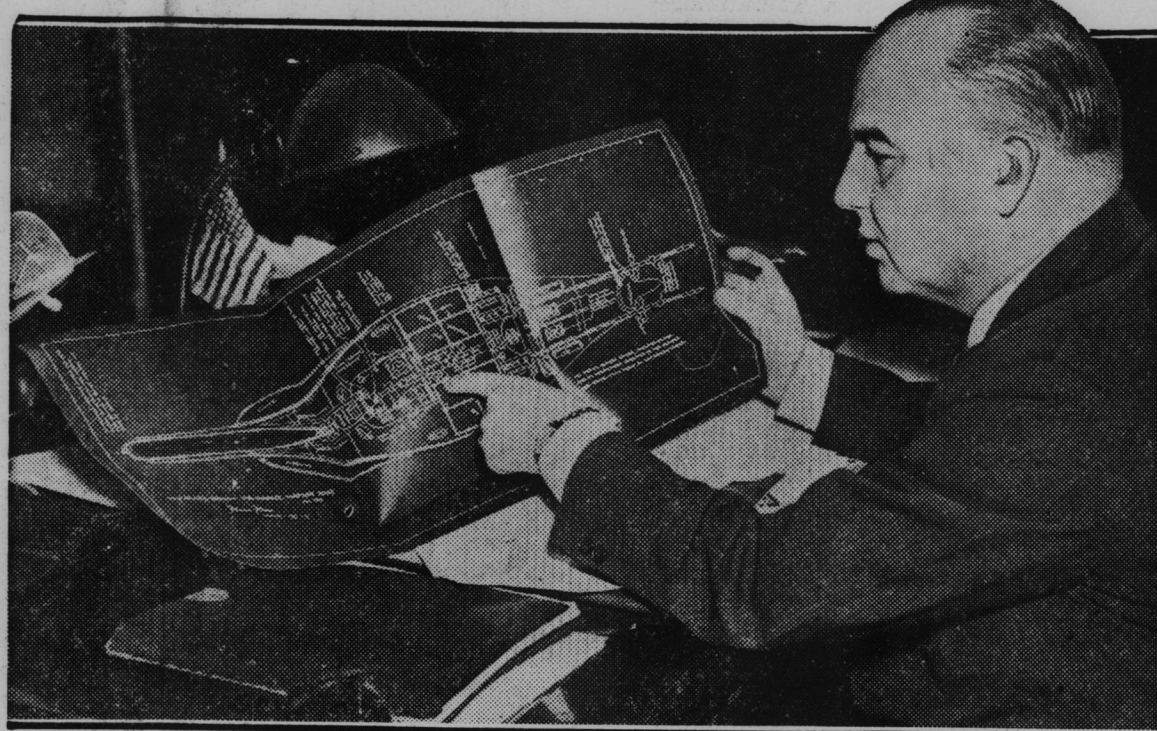
