

# WARREN RELEASED FROM JAIL AFTER HEARING MONDAY

## Neal, Shot By Warren, Reported Improving

Van Warren, who shot Fred Neal after an argument in the Bass Service Station in Halifax two weeks ago tonight, was released under a \$2000 bond after a hearing before Joseph A. Dickens, Mayor of Halifax, last Monday afternoon. Warren has been in jail since the night of the shooting, pending the outcome of Neal's condition. He will be tried in the next term of Superior Court.

Attaches of the Roanoke Rapids Hospital, where Neal was brought after receiving the bullet wound, reported today that the injured man continues to improve. He was shot in the right side, the ball penetrating his intestines seven times. Warren is charged with shooting Neal with intent to murder.

The argument is said to have started over a small boy who had had some trouble with Warren previously. The two men were in the Bass Service Station, located immediately across the street from the Court House in Halifax, when the argument took place. Warren is said to have left the station, secured a revolver at his home, and returned to shoot Neal as he stood by a refrigerator in the station. A second shot missed its intended victim and passed between two bystanders.
