ADVISES PEOPLE TO KEEP "HEADS UP" IN DANGERS FROM FLOOD

The Health Department wishes to commend the people of this county for their splendid cooperation in coming in for typhoid vaccinations and in bringing their children in for diphtheria and small-pox vaccinations. We have been able to erect a formidable barrier of protection against these diseases by this prompt action.

The doctors throughout the flood area in our county and the Health Department personnel have given at least 6,000 doses of typhoid vaccine since the flood. Between three and four hundred children have been vaccinated for diphtheria and smallpox.

But we must not allow ourselves to relax our vigilance for even a moment. Be sure all drinking water is safe before use. Be careful of all raw vegetables, since typhoid fever can be transmitted by uncooked fruit and vegetables that are contaminated as well as by water or milk that is contaminated. Make sure all garbage is covered and that all screens are intact in order to keep flies from bringing in a possible deadly dose of germs to your kitchens. In other words, as many a football coach has 'bawled' to his team—"Heads Up".
