

# RED CROSS WORK UNDERWAY

## VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR COMPLETION OF REFUGEE GARMENTS

The Production Department of the Roanoke Rapids Chapter of the American Red Cross is making rapid progress toward the completion of the quotas given to the local chapter for the refugees from the war torn countries. Approximately 20 women have volunteered for the work under the supervision of Miss Evelyn Tillman, head of the home economics department in the local school, and the 60 garments to be made here are rapidly nearing completion.

However, Miss Tillman said today that the work needed additional volunteers as the quotas must be filled by Thursday, September 4. Those women who are willing to help out in the work are asked to get in touch with the supervisor immediately.

The hours are from 8 to 12 in the morning and from 1 to 5 in the afternoon. The work is being carried on in the vacant store building formerly occupied by the Rosemary Bakery next door to E. W. Smith, Inc.

Those who would like to take the work into their homes may call for material, patterns, and directions. Some women have been following this procedure and it has proven very satisfactory, Miss Tillman said.

The director said that the women have been volunteering very willingly and graciously. She would like to have 8 in the morning and 8 in the afternoon. Mrs. Julia Botton has been in charge of securing the volunteers for the work.

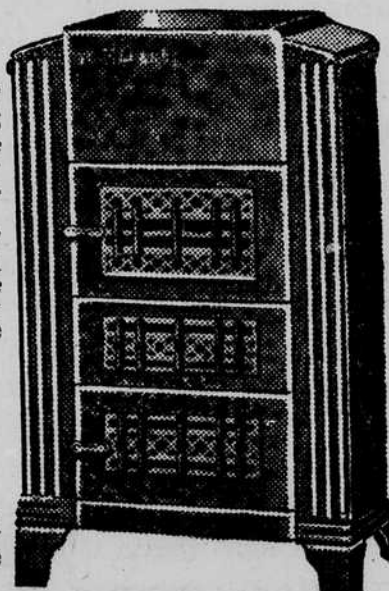
