

Furniture Warehouse Purchased

Jaffe Will Conduct Big Sale For Flood Victims At Suffolk

Announcement is made this week by the H. I. Jaffe Furniture Company, said to be the largest individually owned furniture store in the South, of the sale of an entire, complete "factory warehouse" of furniture at their Suffolk, Virginia, store. Over 10 carloads of bedroom furniture is being "sacrificed" at this sale, according to Mr. Jaffe, and the order is said to comprise the largest single purchase of furniture ever made by an individual operator in this section.

In a double-page advertisement in this issue the furniture dealers list over 1,000 items in dressers, vanities, beds, chests, mattresses and miscellaneous items which they say will be sold below actual normal wholesale cost. Reductions of up to 66 2-3% are featured, according to the announcement.

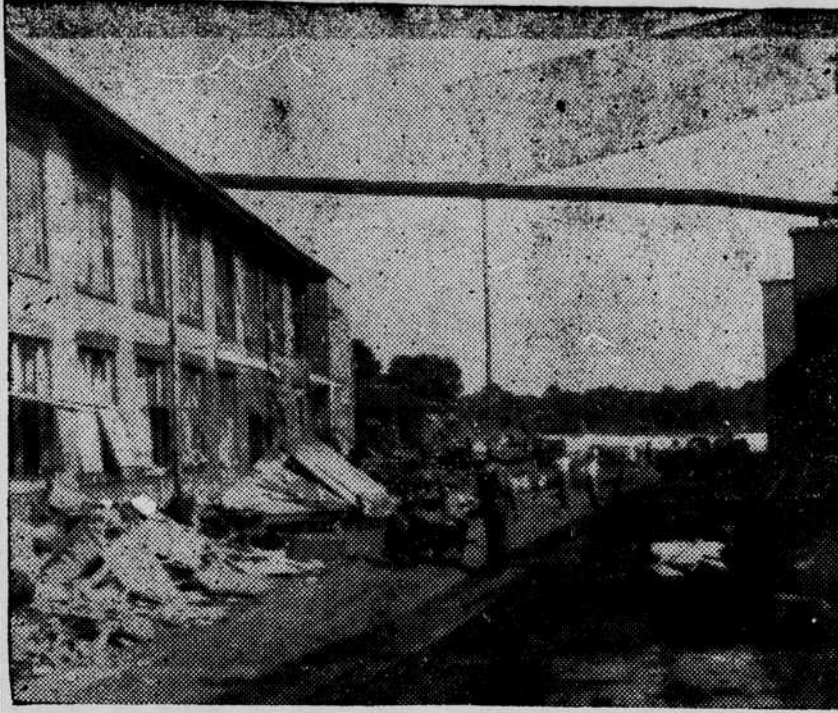
Sensing the fact that hundreds of families in the vast territory served by the Jaffe Associated Stores were literally "wiped out" by recent floods, H. I. Jaffe, president of the company, gives this as the reason for making this huge "special purchase." "Many of our most faithful customers have seen their belongings washed away by the high waters within the last two weeks," Mr. Jaffe said in an interview the first of the week, "and we propose to make it as easy as possible for them to re-furnish their homes."

The huge sale of furniture will be conducted only from the Jaffe store in Suffolk, located at 189 to 199 E. Washington Street. Free transportation will be provided to and from Suffolk from any of the associate stores. The H. I. Jaffe Furniture Company operates a branch store in Roanoke Rapids, and others in Smithfield, Franklin, Suffolk, Portsmouth and Newport News, Virginia.
