

TEACHERS TO REPORT FOR DEPARTMENTAL MEETINGS ON SEPT. 6

The Roanoke Rapids schools will get underway for the 1940-41 school year on Monday, September 9, according to an announcement by C. W. Davis, superintendent, this week. Teachers are to report here for departmental meetings on Friday, September 6. A general meeting will be held on Saturday, September 7.

EIGHTY-FIVE TEACHERS

Eighty-five teachers will be employed here for the white schools, one more than was employed last year. The new teacher will be in the commercial department where the increase is shown.

Only ten of the teachers will be new in the local schools. The remaining 75 will return to jobs held here last year.

Mr. Davis said today that not all teachers had been placed in homes in the city. The old teacherage, located on the corner of Hamilton and Third streets, will not be operated this year.

REGISTRATIONS

All first grade children, beginners and repeaters, are asked to register at their respective buildings Friday morning, September 6 from 9:30 to 11:30.

All grammar grade pupils above the first grade who did not attend school in Roanoke Rapids last year are asked to report in Miss Hearne's office Friday, September 6 at 9:30 o'clock. The office is located in the new building at the rear of the high school building.

All high school pupils who expect to attend Roanoke Rapids Schools for the first time this year and who are not registered are asked to meet in the high school auditorium Thursday morning, September 5, at nine o'clock for registration. Seventh grade pupils who were in our schools last year need not register.

Pupils in grades two to six who attended the city schools last year need not register until Monday, September 9.

All high school pupils who were in school last year and who have already registered need not report until Monday, September 9.

A notice will run in next week's Herald concerning the other pupils. Miss Bentley will be in her studio September 5 and 6 from 10 until 12 o'clock to register students in piano.

In speaking of the proposed textile building, which is planned for construction immediately back of the junior high school building, the superintendent stated that WPA officials had said the school might expect work to begin on the textile plant as soon as labor is released on the new building going up on the Littleton road. That structure will be finished about the middle of September, it is expected.

Original plans called for the completion of the textile building by the first part of September, but WPA labor has not been sufficient to meet the demands for work on the various projects in the county during the past few months.

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Corporation Gets \$343,000

An allotment of \$343,000 to the Roanoke Electric Membership Corporation was approved on August 26, according to announcement by Harry Slattery, Administrator of Rural Electrification.

This allotment was made to the Halifax County corporation, whose manager is L. W. Anderson of Halifax, for the extension of services in Halifax, Bertie, Northampton, Hertford, Gates Chowan and Perquimans counties. The extensions will serve 1,410 members on 382 miles of lines.

The borrower has previously been allotted the sum of \$87,000 to build 81 miles of line in Halifax County to serve 352 members.
