

COUNTY SCHOOLS OPEN

MOST UNITS GET STARTED MONDAY; NEGROES' OPEN 16

County-Wide Meeting At Halifax Friday At 10 a.m.; 70 Teachers

All County white schools, with the exception of two, will open Monday morning, September 9, according to V. C. Matthews, county superintendent. Hardrawee and Ringwood started Wednesday, September 4. Enfield, a city unit, also began on Sept. 4. The colored schools of the county will not open until September 16.

Friday morning, September 6, a county-wide teachers meeting will be held in the auditorium of the Halifax graded school. The meeting will get underway about 10 a.m. Mr. Matthews was in touch with a couple of outside speakers yesterday, but was unable to say who would make the principal address. Ronald Hocutt, director of the State Highway Safety Division, will talk to the teachers on the importance of teaching safety in the classroom.

Prior to the meeting, the highway patrolmen and Dr. Robert Young, County Health Officer, will give the prospective bus drivers a mental and physical examination. Some of the drivers have already been certified.

The number of busses in the county used to transport children has increased by three this year over last. There will be 33 busses used to transport white children and 14 for colored children, making a total of 47 for the county.

Most of the schools are expecting to observe some sort of program for the opening day. W. J. Norwood of Roanoke Rapids will be among the speakers for the opening day. He will address the pupils and teachers of the William R. Davie school on the Roanoke Rapids-Littleton road.

All teachers except one, the home economics teacher at William R. Davie, have been elected. When the list is complete, there will be 70 teachers and principals employed. Scotland Neck leads in number with 21, while Aurelian Springs comes second with 15 (Roanoke Rapids, Weldon, and Enfield are city units and are not counted in this list).
