

Manchester Operating At Normal

The Manchester Board and Paper Company plant, which was almost inundated by the flood here, started practically normal operations last Friday afternoon, according to announcement by assistant manager, O. G. Horton, today.

The power plant is the only part of the plant which has not yet been reconditioned for operation. All of the employees have been at work at all times, with no loss of work except for the period in which the building was under water.

Production will not reach its peak for a few days as some of the paper is undergoing reprocessing.

E. H. Graves, resident manager of the Halifax Paper Company, could not be reached this afternoon, but it is understood that rehabilitation work there is going forward rapidly. The pulp mill is expected to start up this week-end and the management has announced that it will start buying pulp-wood.

Work was pushed on the pulp mill since the local pulp mill furnishes associated units in other cities with the pulp. The finishing room is being reconditioned in the meanwhile and will get underway within a short while.

Home On Vacation

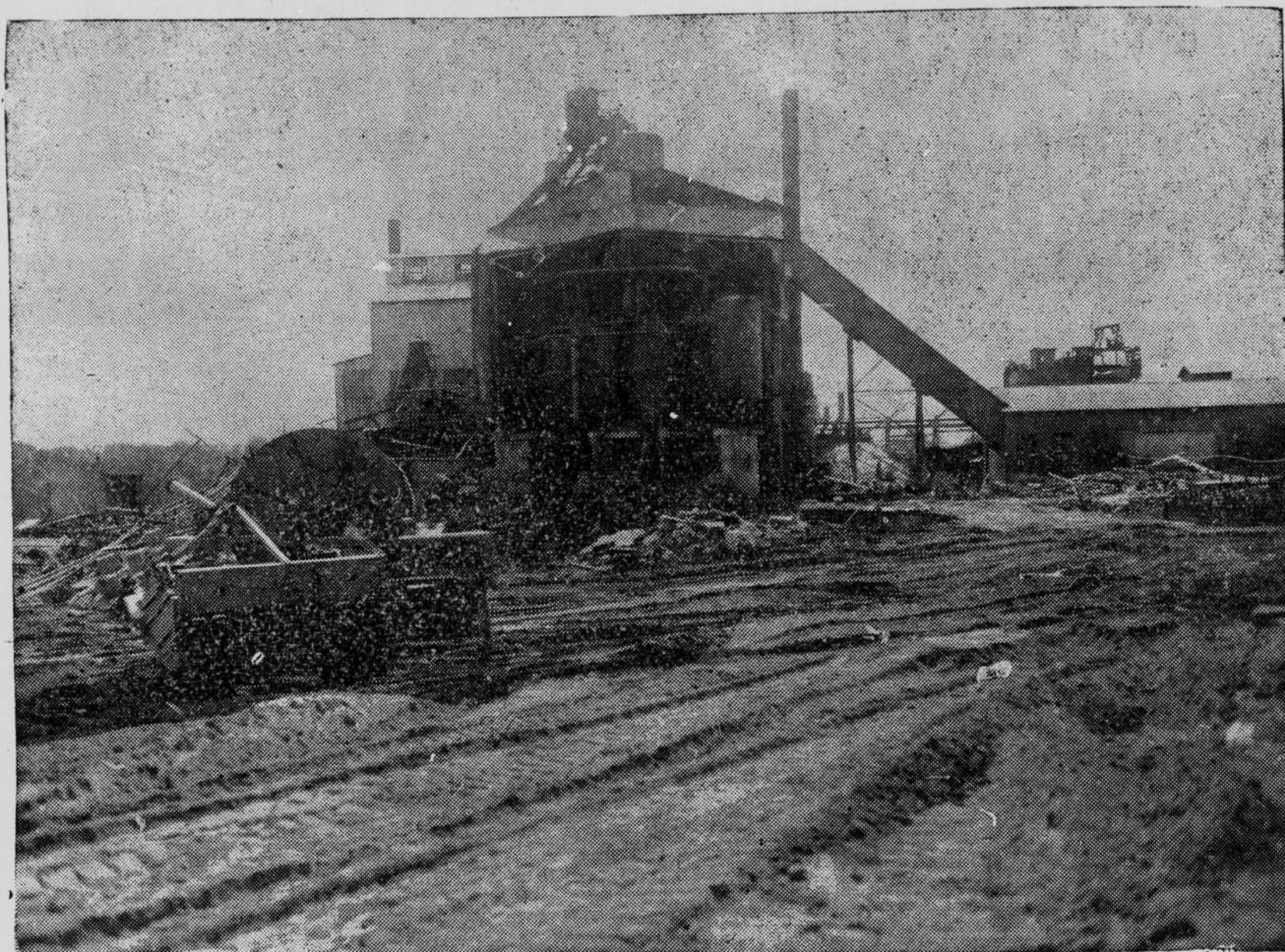
