### BRIEF STATE NEWS

A new bank has been organized at Kathryn, N. D., with J. Jensen as cashier.

Underwood is soon to vote on whether she wants to be a full-fledged city or not.

W. J. Watson, formerly of Elgin, will have charge of the new bank to be established at Timmer, N. D.

Business men and citizens of Balfour have subscribed \$5,960 to the fund for a new school building in that city.

Berthold will build \$30,377.12 worth of cement sidewalks this year. The contract was awarded to T. T. Stev-rud, of Elbow Lake, Minn.

Dunc. Beaton of Bottineau topped the South St. Paul market the other day with a car of hogs, receiving \$853 for 90 head. A nice little bunch of money.

C. B. Aasness and J. E. Galehouse, of Carrington, have asked the council at Towner to grant them a franchise to operate an electric light plant at Towner.

John Schubert, charged with having robbed the Columbia clothing store at Harvey some weeks ago, was arrested in Wisconsin and brought back to Wells county to face the music.

It is expected that the proposed railroad from Williston to Crosby will be built early this year. The road will be financed by the businessmen of Williston and farmers owning land adjacent to the road.

Joe Watson trapped a full-grown bobcat at his farm on the Little Missouri river the other day. The animal was nearly four feet in length. It had been killing Mr. Watson's chickens, making nightly raids on his hen-coop for sometime.

Governor Burnquist of Minnesota and Governor Hanna of North Dakota will address the convention of United Commercial Travelers of Minnesota, North Dakota and Western Canada in annual session at Minot June 8. Other features of the program are being arranged.

The Flasher Hustler, speaking of the new assessment blanks, says "everything from lodges to pet cats are taxed." Not only pet cats for the list reads "all animals of whatever kind born on or before April 1st," which must include rats, hippopotamuses, rhinoceroses and the lie'uns.

Disclosing total resources of \$88,887,512.08, state banks and trust companies in North Dakota are in the most prosperous condition of their entire history, according to the report issued by the bank examiner, covering the recent call. The 649 banks and 4 trust companies show a total gain of \$1,853,221.47 in resources during the period between December 31 and March 7.

Severyn Thompson, employed on a farm near Antler, came near being smothered last week. With two or three others he was cleaning barley out of a crib bin in the field, and when the party got to the house, Thompson was missed. They returned to find him buried under the snow and ice that covered the top of the bin. He was dug out but was unconscious for several hours.

One out of every twenty-nine residents of the state of North Dakota owns an automobile, according to a motor census just compiled by Donald McLeod Lay, of the editorial staff of The Automobile, a national trade publication. The figures are based on the automobile registrations during 1915 and the census figures of 1910. North Dakota is tied with Indiana for ninth position on the list. The total number of automobiles in the United States is 2,423,788 and the average ownership for the entire country is one out of every 42 persons.

### BATTLESHIP NORTH DAKOTA NEEDS NEW ENGINES

CAN BE PUT INTO COMMISSION IF APPROPRIATION NOW ASKED FOR IS GRANTED.

Some little agitation has resulted from the fact that the battleship North Dakota is out of commission. Recently the executive board of the North Dakota Federation of Commercial Clubs sent a set of resolutions to our congressmen and senators asking that an effort be made to have the North Dakota again placed in commission. Vice President Holbein of the Federation received a letter from Congressman P. D. Norton the other day that throws light upon the subject. It is in part as follows: "I find that in talking with Captain King, who was recently in charge of the super-dreadnaught North Dakota, the Captain tells me that they have been having a great deal of trouble with the old style Corliss engines in this ship ever since she was put into commission."

The North Dakota is now on the reserve list, but in case of emergency, could be called into service at once. Captain King expressed the opinion that if war was declared with any country tomorrow, the North Dakota would at once join the Atlantic fleet and would be able to take part in any naval warfare that might be necessary.

The intention of the Navy Department at the present time is to place new engines in the North Dakota. An appropriation of \$600,000 has been asked for by the Secretary of the Navy for this purpose. This appropriation of \$600,000 will be carried in this year's Naval Appropriation bill.

It will take, so Captain King tells me about six months after the contract has been let, to build the new engines to be placed in the ship. Then it will take about six months to install the engines. The only time that the ship will really be out of commission is during the time of the installation of the new engines."

### Bridges in Bad Shape.

Several of the bridges across the coulee south and southeast of Minot, are in bad shape. The high water has washed out the grade in several places, making the travel either exceedingly dangerous or impossible. The county commissioners have been informed and will have the bridges repaired as soon as material can be hauled out.

### HANDLING YOUNG CHICKS.

Chicks need no food from 2 to 3 days after hatching. They should be kept warm. During the first week the temperature should not fall below 95 degrees and the second week it should be held up to 90 degrees. When they crowd under the hover of the brooder it is a sign that they are cold. Fifty chicks is enough for one brooder. When too many are put together they sometimes pile on top of each other and smother. When the chicks are 48 to 60 hours old feed them equal parts of bread crumbs and oat meal to which add a little chick grit. Feed four or five times a day and only what they will eat up in a few minutes. After the third day feed a good quality of chick feed. Sprinkle it in the litter which should be made up of a thin layer of short cut alfalfa or fine cut straw. A home made chick feed can be made as follows: Cracked wheat 25 pounds, fine screened cracked corn 20 pounds, pin-head oat meal

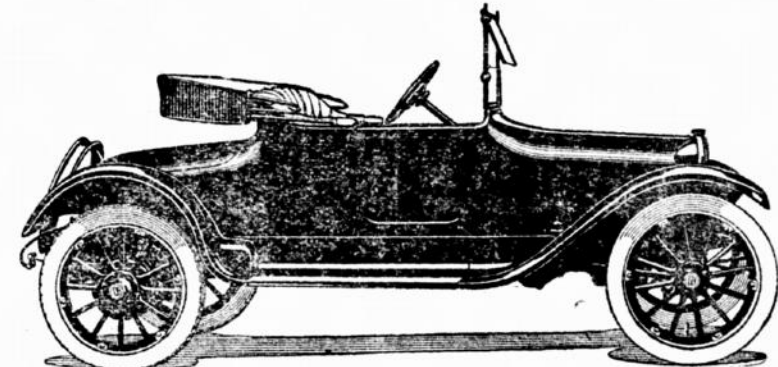

It Speaks for Itself

10 pounds, crushed peas 3 pounds, millet seed 2 pounds, and fine charcoal 3 pounds. Keep grit charcoal and water before them all the time. After the first week begin giving beef scraps in small quantity. Feed sparingly at first, one ounce for 40 or 50 a day. Provide green food, sprouted oats are best. Mangels, green clover and lettuce are also good. When on open range the grass will answer. After the chicks are two weeks old a mixture of equal parts of wheat bran and

beef scraps may be kept before them all the time. When four weeks old the following mash mixture can be fed in hopper. Equal parts of bran, corn meal, wheat middlings and rolled oats to which add 10 per cent of meat scraps. When the chicks are six weeks old ground oats may be used in place of rolled oats. And when six weeks old the chicks feed can be discontinued and equal parts of wheat and cracked corn fed in its place. Keep the mash before them in hopper.
