Atlantic City Hospital, because of its inadequate size and equipment provides hospital accommodations which are 64 per cent. below the accepted minimum standard of the provisions necessary for the large permanent population the hospital must serve. This does not take into account the thousands of summer visitors.

The hospital officers recently made a survey of hospital facilities throughout New Jersey. This revealed that Atlantic City and Ventnor with a combined population of 60,000 makes the smallest provision of hospital facilities of any other community comparable in size and importance in the State. The hospital appeal is based upon the greater need for enlarged accommodations, which the committee points out, is effectively demonstrated by the following table showing the comparative hospital accommodations throughout the State:

"This means that we should have nearly 200 more beds to meet the hospital needs of the people who live here the year round in Atlantic City and Ventnor," Senator Wilson said. 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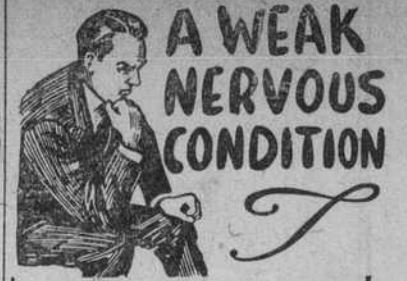
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
