**Through Chicago Service
Begins On Pennsylvania**

Through the speedy rehabilitation of Broad Street Station train shed, recently gutted by a conflagration, the Pennsylvania Railroad began through sleeping car service between Chicago and Atlantic City June 24, and from Atlantic City to Chicago, effective Monday, June 25, according to an announcement made by Division Passenger Agent James S. Murphy, of the resort office of the Pennsylvania Lines.

Mr. Murphy stated that a corps of repairmen had been at work in shifts on reconstruction of the shed and that sufficient progress has been made to permit railroad traffic movements, especially of limited trains from the West.

The Chicago-Atlantic City service is a recent attraction offered by the Pennsylvania System, and was announced by Mr. Murphy at a meeting of the resort Chamber of Commerce, and before various other civic organizations.

Along with the announcement of the general expansion of through service from the greatest centres of the land to Atlantic City, the Pennsylvania is issuing a beautifully illustrated folder which carries new word of the glories of Atlantic City and its neighbor resorts throughout the country.
