Tells Cause Of Leaf Shedding

State Forester Wilber Declares Plant Lice Nuisance—Can Be Controlled

INSECTS SUCK SAP

In response to the numerous requests that have been coming into his office for advice on the cause of maple shade trees dropping their

leaves and causing a sticky substance to be deposited on the sidewalks, State Forester C. P. Wilber stated today that the trouble is caused by what is commonly known as plant lice and they may be controlled by spraying the under side of the leaves with "Black Leaf 40" or a strong stream of water from a garden hose.

According to Mr. Wilber, the plant lice, or aphids, attack the lower side of the leaves from which they suck the sap. These minute insects may be found on various kinds of trees, but they are especially noticeable and numerous on maples. They exude a sticky substance called "honey dew," some of which is deposited on the sidewalks. A severe attack will cause the tree to drop its leaves, but ordinarily no permanent harm is done.

The insects may be controlled by spraying with nicotine sulphate, which is sold under the trade name of "Black Leaf 40," to which may be added soap, which causes the material to stick to the leaves. A strong stream of water from the garden hose, directed at the under surface of the leaves, will also be helpful in controlling the lice.
