The amusement department is increasing in size each day. Captain Hardy, the champion shot of the world, will give exhibitions daily in front of the grand stand. His exhibition will close with some daring shooting from an automobile, and the explosion of a bomb three hundred feet in the air displaying an American flag. In addition to the work of Captain Hardy and numerous other attractions there will be an abundance of band music, eight bands now being on the list to furnish music for the fair.

The racing program looks better every day, a number of good horses having entered the meet during the past week.
