The state legislature, or what was alleged to have been the state legislature, adjourned the 12th inst., having spent the allotted sixty days principally engaged in bringing disrepute to the state. One thing is sure—it is a thing of the past. Governor McDonald will never discredit his administration by convening the caucus hoodlums in special session.

The Clayton Milling Co. is running its plant full time and turning out exceptionally high grade products. Considering the high freight rates asked on milling products from Colorado, Oklahoma and Kansas points, the products of the local mill should displace those from other states; besides, everyone in this country should take pride in patronizing home industry.

For the first time in the history of the state of New Mexico the penitentiary system of this state is being conducted without a deficit to its credit. Superintendent John B. McManus appeared before a committee of the state legislature a few days ago and pointed out that deficiency appropriations amounting to more than \$32,000 made by previous legislatures were to cover shortages previous to his administration. At this time and under his management the penitentiary has been operated within its appropriation and on the earning of state convicts.

We congratulate the voters of the county upon the fact that they are no longer being misrepresented at Santa Fe by men who did not receive the suffrage of the people. That old caucus majority is as dead as Heck, and the governor can be depended upon to keep it dead. The people of Union county, irrespective of party, must remember the treatment accorded them and their duly elected representatives by the caucus majority, and must make the majorities for the peoples' candidates so big in the next election that the jimmy will lose its effectiveness. Remember that you were practically disfranchised, whoever you voted for.

Chairman Hilles, of the republican national committee, after a conference with some New York manufacturers, merchants and business men, declares there can be no national prosperity until a republican is returned to the white house. Recalling the campaign that Chairman Hilles managed so disastrously for Professor William H. Taft, it will be readily remembered that calamity clacking is one of the chief items in his political stock in trade. During the campaign he flooded the columns of the daily press with dire predictions of disaster if Taft was defeated, and spent much money advertising the same distressful forebodings in the leading magazines of the country. The professor was defeated, carrying but two states in the union, and Chairman Hilles so completely discredited

that his retirement as a political forecaster would seem inevitable. It seems, however, that he is again on the job, only to meet with the same cheerful results that accompanied previous efforts. This nation does not have to depend on any republican in the white house for its prosperity. The days of republican prosperity have become ancient history.—El Paso (Tex.) Times.

The committee in charge of the Belgian Relief Fund, which is expended "for women, children and other non-combatants," issue an appeal for further contributions. More than \$206,000 has already been expended in their imperative work of saving human beings from actual starvation, and the need of such help is as great as ever. As told by more than one correspondent, Belgian mothers go groping through rubbish heaps in search of empty condensed milk cans, in hope that some few traces of the contents may remain. "It's the only way to get milk for the babies," said a soldier. "I've seen them run their fingers around the inside of a can that looked bright as a new coin, and hold them in the babies' mouths to suck. But it's little we can do. So much is needed."

The committee is now appealing to American boys and girls to subscribe to the Princess Marie Jose Fund, being collected in the name of the little Belgian princess. All contributors are requested to write the little princess a short letter not over twenty words, and in return a souvenir card from the princess will be sent. Your letter will become a part of the historical records of the Belgian government and will be preserved for ages. Austria Regulates Potato Prices.
The maximum prices for potatoes have been in force throughout Austria. Two hundred and twenty pounds wholesale cost from 9 to 12 kronen (\$1.80 to \$2.40). People found to be hoarding more potatoes than are necessary for their requirements can be compelled to sell them, and any one contravening the new regulations is liable to a fine not exceeding 5,000 kronen or arrest and imprisonment.
