**New Public Road to Montoya**

A new public road to Montoya was laid out this week by County Surveyor Teo. D. Martinez. The survey begins on the S. E. corner of Section 14, Township 11 North, Range 30 East, thence West 4 miles to S. W. corner of Section 17, thence South 1 mile to N. W. corner of Section 29, Township 11 North, Range 30 East.

W. A. Jackson was in the burg Wednesday. He is getting ready to put in about 150 acres of forage crops this year. He says the Oklahoma immigrants have settled around his place this winter as thick as black birds.

Capt. J. P. C. Langston informs us that he has a very fine well of water on his ranch. The well was sunk by hand drill process, and he struck water at the depth of 100 feet. The well easily adds \$1,000 to the value of his homestead.

While here he held Quarterly Conference, and all reports received by him from local church officials were encouraging. The reports show that all told \$220 has been raised for all purposes since November 1905. He returned to El Paso Sunday night.
