

EDUCATION OF WOUNDED MEN TO BEGIN AT ONCE

Offices Are Already Open in Fourteen of Chief Cities of United States Where Information Is Given Out.

(BY MORNING JOURNAL SPECIAL LEASED WIRE) Washington, Nov. 17.—Offices are now open in fourteen of the chief cities of the United States to receive the applications of disabled soldiers and sailors of the American army and navy for free education to equip them for the vocation for which they are most fitted.

At each office are stationed men to advise the disabled fighters as to what they are entitled to receive, a medical officer and a man to obtain employment for them when they are ready to go to work.

While receiving education the government will pay the disabled man \$65 a month and in addition will provide him with the funds necessary to pay educational fees.

During his training period allowances will be made by the government to his dependents such as wife, children and mother.

When the disabled man has finished his training the federal board promises to have employment ready for him.

Federal board for vocational education states: "The worst mistake a disabled man can make is to drift into a low grade, unskilled occupation. Without any training he must compete with the normal man in a line of work where brute strength and physical fitness alone count and there can be no doubt as to the outcome when work becomes slack.

"The temptation to take these low-grade, unskilled jobs is very strong while war prices prevail, especially as pay is higher because there is a lack of help and the quality of the work is not looked at too closely; but jobs commanding war prices and employing large numbers of particularly skilled or unskilled hands are not always going to exist.

POPE IS READY TO GREET YOUNG FREE NATIONS

Letter to Papal Secretary of State Says Report of Regret at Italian Success Maliciously Made.

WILSON CAN NOT ATTEND BRITISH DAY CELEBRATION

Washington, Nov. 17.—President Wilson will not attend the celebration of Britain's day at New York Sunday, December 8. In a letter to Judge Alton B. Parker, chairman of the committee which extended the invitation, the president said:

"I am very much interested in the plan for celebrating the notable courage and achievements of the army and navy of Great Britain and Ireland and the overseas dominions on Sunday afternoon, December 8, and it is with unaffected regret I find myself obliged to say I cannot be present. It is my plain duty to be here for I can act more promptly on matters which seem to mature almost every hour, and I am sure I can be more useful to my common cause by staying here than by being present, much as I should like to join in praising the part which Great Britain's soldiers and sailors have played in this great war for the freedom of the world."

THIRD ARMY TO BE OCCUPATION FORCE

It will be under the immediate direction of General Pershing, the commander in chief, who will be in command of the American positions in occupied territories.

BULK OF SOCIAL DISEASE IN ARMY AMONG RECRUITS

Health Department Report Shows That New Mexico Averages Better Than a Great Many States.

(SPECIAL DISPATCH TO MORNING JOURNAL) Washington, Nov. 17.—The following statistics the per centage of men suffering from venereal disease when received into the army has been issued by the United States public health department:

"The task of combating the spread of venereal disease among the civil communities of the United States is a task that has taken on a tremendously added importance with the coming of peace," declares Surgeon General Rupert Blue of the U. S. public health service.

Statistics dealing specifically with venereal disease among the men entering the training camps have just been issued. These figures deal with one million men, a quota from every state in the union.

Taking Maine as an example, out of every hundred draftees who arrived at the various camps to which they were sent, two (on an average) had a venereal disease. Out of every ten thousand, 292 had a venereal disease.

It should be noted that these figures apply only to the million men whose reports first reached the adjutant general's office from the various camp surgeons. Later reports may possibly change these results.

FREED CAPTIVES RUSH AMERICAN STORES OF FOOD

(BY MORNING JOURNAL SPECIAL LEASED WIRE) Verdun, Nov. 17 by The Associated Press.—Russians, Italians, French and Rumanians by thousands—all released by the Germans—have streamed into the American lines. The question of feeding and housing them is taxing the facilities of the army and the various organizations which have been furnishing the Americans with luxuries.

MAXIMILIAN SAYS HIS PEACE PLAN NOT CONSIDERED

(BY MORNING JOURNAL SPECIAL LEASED WIRE) Copenhagen, Nov. 17 (by The Associated Press).—The former imperial German chancellor, Prince Maximilian of Baden, has issued a pamphlet, saying: "My peace policy was entirely upset by the proposal for an armistice, which was handed to me in complete form on my arrival in Berlin. I fought against it for practical and political reasons. It seemed to me a grave mistake to allow the first step toward peace to be accompanied by such an amazing admission of Germany's weakness."

"Neither the enemy powers nor our own people regarded our military situation such as to make desperate measures necessary. I proposed that the government as a first measure should state exactly its program of war aims and demonstrate to the world our agreement with President Wilson's principles and our readiness to undergo heavy national sacrifices to fulfill these principles."

"I was told in reply that there was no time to wait for the effect of such a statement and that the situation at the front demanded that a proposal for an armistice should be made within twenty-four hours, to be supported by publication of the names of a new and unimpeachable government."
