Coal Fields of Mexico.

The supreme financial and commercial question with the alert and active capitalists of our sister republic has been, and is, are there coal beds in this republic. This is a question which has been discussed for years, and put down as either: all through there are isolated imperfections; which cannot afford more; or the mining timber absolutely necessary to carry on mining operations. We can safely say that the coal beds of this republic are amply adequate for all demands. We will at present list a few of the coal measures of the country in order to disabuse the prevailing fear of lack of fuel in this country for mining, milling, railroad, manufacturing and domestic purposes.

There is anthracite, lignite and superior coaling coal eighty miles south of Chihuahua and on the direct line of the Mexican central railroad. There are seven distinct coal beds in the state of Durango. The old hat in the ground of Buena Vista is on a portion of a vast coal field. The state of Puebla is four separate anthracite coal regions. Sonora has on the Yaqui river a coal field which is amply sufficient to supply all possible demands for northwestern Mexico for an hundred years. Santa Rosa, Coahuila has an outcropping vein of coaling coal seven feet in width.

This fuel question for all needed purposes in this republic is forever settled. We have a great abundance and we have much to spare the United States or any other country when their coal fields shall have become exhausted.
